Wherfore being most assured not only by common report, but also by certaine knowledge(right honorable)that those good and commendable exercises which are to our Country beneficiall, and to our bodies needefull, are of your Lordinip especially commended, I am the bolder to dedicate the fruits of my weake paines in this simple trauaile to your honorable patronage and defence. An olderule that I read(my good Lord)in Cicero, being a yong scholer, which was, that I must accommodare sermone and personam, maketh me to cut of all my ynckhorne termes, & flattering infinuations in wryting to your honor, knowing that I haue to doe with fuch a one as hath out of Christes precepts learned to leeke for veritie, and not for vanity, for fubitance of matter, and not for superfluouseloquence in words. of Noble personages, but these Regios Canes (for fo the Philosopher termeth them, I commit eyther to the mercie of God to convert, or to his iustices as byting Dogges to be entreated. In the dedication of this my rude trans flation vnto your honor, I feke not to illustrate your excellent vertues, which were an infinite trauayle, or to paint out mine owne skill or cunning which were vaine, but rather to benefite my Country, & to eafe my Countrymen of their griefes and maladies, by converting that which before was onely knowne vnto Phisitians and Italians into their owne natiue speeche and mother tongue. Although the translator be simple, and his knowledge not great, yet I doubt not but the worthynesse of the matter shall counteruayle the simplicitie of the person, if there be any carping Momus that will fooner reprehend, then take paines to amend this my simple exercise, let him remember the olde Prouerb. Ne futor vltra crepidam. I befeech your honor to accept and receyue this my small trauayle, as a teltification of the finguler good affection I beare vinto your Lordship, and it shall not onely prouoke me to take paines and occupie my felfe in weightier

matters, but also binde me continually to pray vnto the almightie for the preservation of your Lordships helth, with the dayly encrease of vertue and honour, to his heavenly pleasure, and your singular contentation.

# Mayster Alexis of Piemont unto the Reader.

thath beine a very auncient opinion of Philosophers (worthy Readers) that there is given
but o man of nature, a desire to understand, for they
supposed, that ours soules in taking imperfection,
through the uniting with flubstance, by the means
of understanding, should approch the necess to recouer their winges alreadie lost, and to returne unto
their pristinate perfection: but sorasmuch as divers

of them , were inclined to fundgie waves of buberftanbing, fomere= ferre the occasion buto the farres , other buto the predomination in our bodges, moze of one humoz then of an other. Briftotle diffinctly notwithflanding, feemeth to attribute enery thing in this, buto our election, Sobich through the pretext of fome felicitie, or profite, both dispose by to practife rather one thing then an other . But berilpe which of them foeuer is true, the inclination of my nativitie, I have alwayes knowne to have beene given to the bnderftanbing of bivers things, and especially of those, which appertenne buto the cure of mens bodies. And to put it in executio, I bispoled my felfe to trauaile biners Countries , and to be conversaunt with divers forces of peo= ple, not omitting with all industrie thosowly to fearth out the under= franding of the fecretes of many nations, and with them likewife to make experience, by putting them into practife, by reafon whereof in thort fpace, through the recovery of helth, which the people did fcele, I became to famous, that I obfcured the names of the most capere Philitions that were, through which occasion I have beene reforted bonto as it were with infinite kinds of Pations, with exceeding reuerence, buto my great credit. And although for all things, I rende= sed thankes buto the binine bountie, pet inplumentle numbe was not bopde of eneric sparkle of ambition and glozie. I wrote them in the peares palled, certaine tryfling things, part whereof were of my ic= cretes (although weake) belonging buto philick, part buto the beweifying of women, and part buto other plactifes, to manifelt buto the worlde that I had knowledge in militicall thinges, whereby I concepued to obtaine greater glozie, then much to helpe, having alwayes referred in the princest partes of my heart as a most precious creafure, the profound fecrets of the Art of healing, and the trucer= perience of the fame, for the which I have bene alwayes had in elpeciall beneration . Reyther was their any (although a molt beare friend) that might get of me any fmail intelligence of my fecretes, fo much I befired not to have any part of my glorie or reputation de= muched. And bicaufe energe mans operations, are directed buto

fome landable ende, or that we accompt worthie of commendation, I being incited long fince, and of mp bearefriendes requelted, toat I woulde for a bniuerfall benefite bnto all the worlde, reduce into lyght, thefe my fecretes, to the ende they might profite the abient, and those which arefarre biftant from the Region where I inhabit. I refused to accept anye one part of their perswalions , accounting him brwife, which to benefit other, would deprine himfelfe of his de= gree, and bignitie, fo much was I blinded in worldly glozie. But being nowe come to that age, in the which it is necessarie by the course of nature, to pecide mp foule bnto God, being nowe impotent, and thinking it the ductie of one min to doe good buto another, and most of all in matters of philick, which are communicated buto be of God for a buinerfail commoditie: I have effermed it not mp part or butpe to preferre mp peculier profite, before that of all the worlde, for in fo boing I must have supposed and beleeved to have committed a great erroz, if I had not pecided my feife culpaple , and repented mee , to haue hidden from the whole worlde, fuch a benefite buto this pre= fent. Ind therefore calling buto memorie the perfeations once made bnto me, of the noble and worthie knight maifter francuccio ABon= gio, touching this matter, and allo examining mine owne confcience, I couloe no longer abftepne from wepting and publifhing them to adorne therewith the worlde, bicaufe otherwife bying, I fhoulde mouthilp haue beene accompted not inferiour bnto an homicide : as atfo to elchue the crymes of anaritious perfons, who having hidden their treasures in the grounds, and Death surprising them, remagns buried togither with their fubitaunce, and bepart out of the would, in the bilptealure both of Gob and man. Therefore if my firft conciu= fion and purpofe to write, was of ambition and baine glorie, as is the propertie of your minds, tittle regarding & which they are bound bnto : This other thall not diffent from the buetie of a chriftian, a one full of compassion towards mankind : that is to publish & dispople mp felf of all those fecrets, buto an butuerfal comodity which hither buto I have kept with my felf as molt dere and precious, & being belirous to accomplish the faid becree, having gathered al my experienced me= bicines , I have thought good to topne them togither , with those which were printed in time paffed, which although they were not of fuch importaunce, nevertheleffe they are things both of fkill, and credit, whereof having gotten a bolume, and read it fundaie times, I have found them fo altered and corrupted, that with difficultie might be perswaded to beleeve that they were mine, they were fo Soholy altered, except only in name. Ind having in part corrected the bolume of the fuperfluous , and thinges of little account abbed buto it , being well perbled , I have toyned therewith this my laft labor of the fourth and finall 15 ooke of my fecretes, which all, are things appertenning onto fundzie and dyners difeafes of mans bodge, has ming referued it as a treasure buto thes prefent, Soberein mape To the Reader.

be read fire hundred foure fcere and odde, bery excellent and most and proned experiences, all true, and enery of them proned as it were infinite times, with infinite fortes of people, and have alwayes beene found effectuail. Repther locke you for any other thing of me in time to come : firft, bicaufe in thefe mp trauaples ( as I have alreadie fapte, I have fpopled my felfe of all that cuer I experienced : fecond= ly, in that I am fo olde, as within thout fpace, you mape suppose to binderfrande rather of my departure out of lyfe, then to recepte of me any other thing, if their be not written fomen hat onber my name of fome malicious person to beceaue you withall, and to encrease the bo: lume without any profite. I will not omit to aduertife the Readers. that they deceave not themselves through my cramples, working thefe medicines wythout the counfell & wholefome aductifements of fome expert Philition, for I never wrote them to that ende, fince from my tender age, contynually I have applied the frudie of good letters, in fuch fort that the fecretes of feiences are not hidden buto me, nepther is there any Cannon of Philick that I have not berie well buverstood: and therefore have knowne with the age, with the fealons , and with convenient time to applie and ble them : Belibes the knowledge to aductife one if neede were to be let blond, and an other to be purged, and having proceeded in this manner, there was neuer any Pacient of mine, that hath not obtarned his bue remedie. you therfore (buto those I speake which budge fland not the cannons of Philicke) when occasion happeneth to ble my fecretes, take the counsell of some expert Philition, to the ende you may attarne the benefite. Bicaule in not knowing to compound, applye, and minificr them as you ought to doc, you may flaunder the Philition that hath bealed many. Accustome therfore to take counsell of fuch Philitions as are boneft, and that practife the Art without france : for there are feene of that profesion many, which being given to prattle, and tell febles to beceaue the people, doe birupcrate the experiences, with faping that they are wicked, and fuch tyke. Pot confidering that ficke perlong are not cured with trifles, as affirmeth the worthy Cornelius Cellus, but with experimented medicines, not newly found out (if well they buder 800de the Art. ) And affure your felues, that by practifing thefe fecrets which I fet openly foorth (as is concenient) and preparing them with biligence, and with choice fimples, alwaiss they will worke according to your intent, for in this booke there

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# Of the fourth and last part of the Secretes of the Reverende Maister Alexis of Piemount.

## The first Booke

A remedie against mistes or cloudes, and other impediments which offend the fight.

Ake Epebright water, Fennell water, red Kole was
ter, and Telenoine water, of eche an ounce: of the inice
of Kew, and of Kolemarie, of eche two drammes, of
Oum Serapine half a dramme, of the gaule of a Partridge or kite, two scruples, mingle them, and make your medicine according to Arte, and ble to put of it many times into
the eye.

To kill wormes that gnaw and eate the heare.

Take a quantitie of the feedes of rotes of marche Pallowes, and boyle them a little, then let it cole, and of the Pucillage which Chalbe taken thereof, you Chall annoynt the heare. The like effect is fane by annointing the heare with the Pucillage made of the leaves of Willowes.

To destroy scurfe or scales in the head.

Take a quantitie of the flower of Ticers, and of the ledes of marth Pallowes bruled and diffolued with vinegar, then annoynt the head, and afterward wash it with the decoason of Bers, and toppes of Pulbery trees. De else take of the berries of Ben, and of the flower of beanes, of eche like quantitie, boyle them in water, with the which you shall wash the head.

Against the falling away of the heare from the bearde or head, called in Italian Tigns.

Take of the pouder of the rotes of Ireos, called flowerded luce, and of the lote of a chimney, of eche like quantitic, mire them with olde oyle, and annount the heade: of elle take of Aristologia, of Merdegrese, of Sal Armenick, of Bdellium, of mustard siede, of Sum Dragant, of ech like quantitie, braye them and mingle them with the oyle of wheate, and vinegar, of both as much as sufficeth, and adde therebuto a little Honye.

## To heale Ringwormes.

Take of yellow being fraged, mire them with Aurpentine, and is an noint the love.

## Another for the fame.

Take of the Athes of Barlicke burnt, and mired with hony, annoynt the place: or elle take Styrax liquida, mingled with binegar, and annoynt the fore: It helpeth also to annoynt it with the Gum of brused Almondes. If the Kingwormes shall be bleerous, take of Incense, of Gum Dragant, of Brimstone, of Aloes, of ech a dramme: of Gum Arabicke two drammes, mire them with bineger, and so annoint.

## A remedie against the itche.

Bitay the toppes and heades of Poppie, and mire them with binegar, and so annoint the place: of else disolve Aloes being beaten with Endine water, and it will doe the like.

#### Another for the fame.

Take of the leaves of Sene one handfull, boyle them with water of Koles, and Smallage, and a little binegar, and wath the love. It helpeth also to wath it, with Sea water wars med:

med : or else with the decortion of wilde Cucombers, reduced into water.

TAke of the Dung of a Coate dried one pounde, of Commin two drammes, of the rotes of wilde Tucombers, of Pight C.J. made, thave, of ech two ounces, of Barlie meale one pounde, of Time gar wherein Front's quenched, as much as lufficeth, make a plaister with boyling the rotes in Liv, and laye it on the belie.

## Against red spots in the Skinne.

Diffill water of Erestes in the end of May, and being mired with honie. Dip therin pieces of Linnen cloth, and lay them byon the foresaide spottes, and as they drie, dip them agayne and laye them on the spots, and you shall see the effect. If you bray the sede, and mire it with binegar, and put it byon the said disease, it doth the like.

## To stay heare that it fall not away.

Take the fuice of Crelles, and annount the rots of the heares and they will not fal. The like effect thall you fee if you walh them with the decocion of the rotes of pightthade, and of Pultard feede boyled in wine: or else the walking of them with the fuice of the stalkes of Phillirea, which also causeth where it is fallen, to grow againe.

A remedie against pimples or spottes in the face.

Take a quantitie of the feedes of Nigella well haped, and mire them with flower and hony, and make thereof a line ment, wherewith you must annount the spots at night when you go to bed, & in the morning walk them with Bersly water.

To remedie a fretting itch and rough or scalie spots.

Take a quantitie of Nigella lædes, a little beused, and boyle them in binegar butill the decoation come to a substance of thicknesse, then adde therebute of ople of Puts, and make it in manner of an oyntment, with the which annoynt the place at night when you go to bed. The like effect is seene by bsing the meale of Orobo mixed with the suice of the rotes of Pionie.

To make heare to grow againe.

Take of the lacenels of Halill nuts, and being well stamped, mire them with the greafe of a Swine, and of a Beare, and annoynt the bare place.

A remedie against the falling away of heare, called in Italian Aree.

Take of the meate of Walnuts, and chewe it well in your mouth, then take it out, and presently lay it on the place.

A remedie to heale Chilblaines which are properly in the ioynts of the fingars through colde, called in Italian, Bügunze, or the itch.

Bolle in water the leedes of Orobo a little brused, and if with the decoasion you bath the Chilblaines, they shall be healed, but if you wash the whole body, it will take away the itche. The like effect to remedie the Chilblaines, is made with the Laues of Therbene, brayed with the sewet or greate of a Swine.

To heale beatings or brufings.

Take of Paritocie, of Pallowes, of Wormwood, of Pothers wort, of Percelie, of hulled Beanes, and boyle them in waster, and then being taken out, frie them in a Frying pan, and in the ende royle them in neive wine fodden, and make thereof a plaisfer. The like effect both the water of wide Time distilled through a Limbeck, in the which you must wet pieces of Linnen cloth, and then applie them but the griefe of size.

## To purge the fleume of the Matrix.

Take the leanes and frakes of Paritoxie in the ende of Pay, and being by aped, diffill them through a Limbeck, and you hall give of the water buto the woman to drinke failing three ounces morning and Evening continually by the space of eight of ten dayes: it is an opener also of the optlations or froppings

Take of the frome called Hematitis, of Boale Armenia, of sche a dramme, let them be finely poudred and grinded by pon a Marble frome, and being well medled with two ounces of Plantine water, you thall give it but the ficke to brinke.

Against the rednesse of the face and nose.

Itill in Balneo Maria, the floures of Applegrefts, which you must gather when they are well opened, and with the water which shall be distilled therof, you shall Mouning and Co uening walh the places.

> To heale the Pleurisey and putrifaction of the matrix.

Take and diffill in the ende of Hap the herbe called Burnet, and of the water which you thall make, cause the sicke per-

Take of the leanes of Radishes, and boyle them in water with asmuch more of the rotes of Dog Fennell, butill they be well sodden, and with the decoation, you shall washe the places from whence they be fallen.

To provoke sweate and to heale the plague.

Take of the herbe called Kape, with the roots of Plantine the lefter, and knot graffe, of eche halfe a handfull, braye them wel, and boyle them in binegar, thraine them thosow a linner cloth, wherof being given but the sicke person to brinke when he goeth to bed, causeth him to sweate out all cuill humors.

Against the paine of the liver, stomacke, and milt.

The of the oyle of Roses source ounces, of Raponticum, in pointer halfe an ounce, of Ware as much as sufficeth, and make thereof a playster, which you must applye hote but the place of the griefe.

To heale Ringwormes, or the Morphew.

Take of the leanes of Eleborus niger, & of Whine tempered with vinegar and honge, and adding therebute a little

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little of a fquill, boyle them, and then annoint the griefe.

Against the disease called Nausea.

Take of the herbe called Sauorie, being finely beaten, and let it be supped failing with a new layd egge rearely rolled, and it will doe the effect.

To cause the naturall places of women to purge.

Discos the herbe called Tansey, and being very finely brayounce,

To heale the hoarcenesse and streightnesse of the brest occasioned of euill humors.

Take of Taxus barbatus, of Fennell, and of Liquerice, of ech like quantitie, and boyle them in water or wine, but yll they be tenderlye fodden, then fraine them thorowe a Linnen cloth, and mire them with fugar, and give thereof but the ficke person to drinke.

A remedie to cause a woman to bring forth the deade creature, or the skin that the childe is wrapped in, called in Italian Secunda.

Take the roots of white Diptamus, of Gentian, of Aristolos gia rotunda, of echelike quantitie: byay them into pouder, and mire therwith the inice of Diptamus, and put therebuto of Artemesia poudsed, and making thereof suppositories, applye them buto the necke of the Matrix.

To cure the distillation of wrine.

Take of Epithimus what quantitie you thinke god, and boyle it in god wine, and oyle olive, and then taking it out of the bestell, lay it hote between the spaull and the printe numbers, and he chalbe healed.

Against rednesse and dropping of the eyes.

The of the blossomes which growe out of the plantes of the Beanes before they be pellow, and distill them in Balneo Maria, and take of the saide water, and drop thereof into the eyes at night, and it will drie by all supersuous humiditie, and remedie the rednesse. The water of Taxus barbatus worketh the like effect in walking the eyes therewith. It helpeth like wife to washe the eyes with the water of Tormentill, into which is put a little of preparated Turia.

To remedie the broken coddes of children.

Take of the rotes of Enula in the ende of Pay, or betweene the middelf of Julie and September, and of the water of them, being distilled thorow a Lembick, cause the sick to drink two or three ounces, both morning and Guening.

Against the bitings of mad Dogges.

Take of the rotes of Gentian one dramme, of Hirrha two drammes, of the cies of burnt Crabbes two drammes, boile altogither in wine, and being strayned, give a cup full thereof the mornings continually but the partie that is bitten. Then walk the wound with sea water: but first you must laye some of the pouder thereon to draw out the putrified bloud.

To remedie the vntemperate heate of the liver.

Take of Liverwort, of Earden and wilde Endine, of eche a handfull, of Mayden heare halfe a handfull, boyle them in water with a little lugar, and being clarified, put but the decorion a little of the wine of Pomegranates of an indifferent taffe, and gine the partie to drinke therof certaine dayes.

## To expell sadnesse.

Take of the herbe called Cranes beke, of Kew, of Pulegium, of ethe like quantitie, by ay them into pouter, and with sugar make little morfels and ble them.

To remedie an olde inveterated cough.

Take of dried Horehounde three poundes, put it into a neive glased earthen pan, and put therebuto ten poundes of sour taine water, and boyle it butill the thirde part be consumed, then straine it into another pan, and put therebuto of god honic one pound and a halfe, and of the pouder of pepper halfe an ownce: and then boyle it agains so long that the thirde part be consumed, and it become thicke. Reepe it in a bestell of glasse, of the swhich the sicke person thall take morning and evening, and at middaye, a sponefull at a time.

Against the paine of the stomacke and the disease called Nausea.

Take of Rue, of Smallage, of Dill, and of Comin, of ech like quantitie: boyle them in a pounde and a halfe of wine, then put therebute of olde opte these pound, boile it againe, and being taken from the fire, you shall dip therein so much of unwashed woll as shall be sufficient to compaste the stomacke: and the diseased person beyng layd bysight, you shall laye it boon him, and after one houre you shall take awaye the saide woll, and make it cleane, and amnoint the pacient againe with Oleum Nardinum, and then cause him to walke a little.

To remedie the stinking or chappes of the toes.

Take and boyle fresh Weale in Uinegar, and put it into the chappes, or else rub the place with the pouder of Pirrha, or Bemomin finely brayed.

Against the paine of the stomacke.

Take a quantitie of greene Peach leanes well biaged, and mire therewith olde greate being berie well purified, then spread it boon a linnen cloth, and applie it botto the stomacké su manner of a playster.

To heale the perillous flix and excoriation or rafing of the bowels, called Dissintiria.

Take the spinie part of an hedgehog, and burne it, then beat it into pouder, and if the sieke person be without an Ague, give him it to drinke with wine, but having an Ague give it with water, and by the space of sire dayes continually you shall cause him to drinke one of the saide heades, and he shalbe hole: or else take of the remnet of an Hare the quantitie of an Hasill nut dissolved in wine or Coates milke, and give it the sieke person to drinke: or else take a live Hare, and having cut the throte thereof, take that hote bloud, and boyle it in broth, and cause the sieke to eate thereof, considering notwithstanding, that if the sieke person anoyde bloud downeward, to braye the toppes of Hale Pettels, and of the suice mired with colde water or the negar, you shall give thereof to drinke three dayes continually e but the sieke person.

## Against the Cholike.

Take a greene Plouer, and burne it with his fethers, and of the affes you shall give the ficke to drinke: or else take of Hintes as much as you may holde in three fingars, of Fennell sedes two ownces, pouder them, and give thereof to drinke but to the ficke person one dramme in fire ownces of warme wine.

# A remedie for him whose fundiment is out, to

Wathe it as often as it cometh forth with warme wine, in the which is boyled Aeruene, and mire it with a little Lie, which is not berie strong. It helpeth also to annount it with liquide Pich, and so put in.

#### To heale broken Kibes.

Take and lay beon them the lunges of a Kamme: or else the athes of Battes, or Kattes, or of earthworms mired with D.i. ople

ople and layd byon the fore. It helpeth also to take the ashes of the teeth of an horse, and lay it on them. If they be not broken, lay byon them Allum brayed with binegar.

To draw out thornes or any other thing fastned in the flesh.

Laye before the place a spunge or locke of woll washed in hote brine, and it shall doe the effect: or else take the bodie or head of a Lucert opened in the mids, and layd byon the place. To doe the like effect, take nettle rotes brayed with salt, and laye them on the hurt: or else the rotes of Agrimonic brayed and layde theron.

To take away Wartes.

When you kill a Pigge, wathe the Warts with that hote bloud, letting it drie oppon them, then presently after wathe them, and they will be hole.

To remedie the stinking of the mouth.

A Ccustome to take of this mirture following, that is to save, of Pulegium dried, of Serpillum or Origanum, of eche lyke quantitie, cause them to be finely poudred and mired with Home, and when you go to bedde, wash your mouth with god wine, in the which Passicke is boyled, or else washe it with god wine, in the which are sodden the leaves of Cinquesolie.

To remedie the paine of the loynes.

Take of quicke Sulphur what quantitie you thinke god, and being brayed into pouder mire it with the fatte, or sewet of what beast you shall thinke god, and then annoint. It helpeth also to take the series of wilde Pintes brayed, and mired with Wheat slower, lay it on them: or else to bray the graine leaves of Ferola in wine, and to laye them thereon.

To heale one that cannot keepe his water.

Take of Snayles called Africani, that is, such as are with out their shelles, and being burned, give the partie oftentimes to drinke thereof in wine. It helpeth also to drinke the braines of an Hare in wine, to eate the reines of the said beast.

To remedie the comming out of the Matrix.

First you must dissolve with the inice of wormwood Aromatical spices, as Gallia muschata, & Lignum Aloes, and ther with annount under the Pausl. Then take Rew, Castor, Arcemelia, of ech like quantitie, boyle them in good wine untill two parts be consumed, and being strained, give thereof to drinke. Then cause the Patrix to be put in with ones handes verye softly, and cause hir to be set in a bath in the which are boiled, of Roses, of Pomegranat slowers, called Balaustie, of Sumack, of the rindes of Pomegranates, of Balles, of Pirtels, of the leaves and inward barke of an Oke, and of Tipzes nuts.

To heale the itch and hardnesse of the Matrix.

Take of Camphora, of Litharge, of Baye berries, as much as you thinke god, and with the white of an Egge, make a suppositorie, and put it into the Patrix. The pouder of Fenergreke mired with the bloude of a Gose, and announting the place ther with, healeth the hardnesse of the Patrix.

To remedie the windinesse of the Matrix.

Take of Mallowes, of Pellitozie of the wall, and being boyled in water, make a bathe for the woman, and after you thall put byon hir bodie this plaister following being warme. Take of the inice of Taxus barbatus, and of Kapes, and be-

ing mired with the Peale of Barlie, make therof a plaister.

To heale the paine of the head, occasioned through the French disease.

Take of Aloes Epatice, one ounce, of the rotes of Pimpers nell, and Buglosse, of eche a handfull, boyle all these in three pintes of water, butill two parts thereof be consumed, and that which remayneth, you shall beuide in source partes to give him in seade of a sirop, it will purge him, and cease the paine.

To cause heare to grow where it is fallen away.

Take and burne Acomes of an Dke, and mice the pouder with the fat of a Beare, and annoint the place.

To remedie eyes that be bloud shot.

Take of the milke of a Goat that is bloud warme, and there with fomentate the cies: or else bray the leanes of Verbena, with a little sait, and there with emplaisfer the eyes, that all the night they may be shut, and the day following take it always, and continuing thus certaine dayes, he shall be hole.

To heale the flix of the bodie and spitting of bloud.

Take of Gum Dragant, Gum Arabicke, of Sanguis Draconis, of Bole Armenia, Amidum, of Spodium, of eche foure scruples: of the stone called Hematicis grounded byon a Parble, of the suice of Plantin, of Poppie, of Mumia, of Acatia, of Hipoquistidos, of eche thee drammes, of sirrop of Roses as much as sufficeth, meddle them well togither, and make thereof a lectuarie

## To remedie the Ptificke.

Bicauarie: or else beate Pine Apple kirnels, which are clean and new, and with soden wine, and clarified Hony, labor them so long in the Horter, that they come but the forme of Hony, and wife to take thereof. It helpeth also, to take the lunges and hart of a wilde gose boyled, and to eate thereof.

An oyntment to heale the stiffenesse or shrinking of sinowes, called Spasmus, comming of a wound taken of some venemous beast.

Take of the meale of Line leedes, of the meale of Barlie, and of Orobi, of eche three ounces, of the meale of Branes one ounce, of Ponye a pounde: of white vinegar three ounces: of hard Pitch fire ounces: of Swines greafe three ounces, mire all togither, and make there of an opintment.

To make milke come into a womans brefts.

Take Dill and boyle it well in water, and of the decocion you shall give but the woman to drinke morning and ever ning four counces at a time, and it will doe the effect.

To remedie the disease called in Italian Fuoco saluatico, and in English S. Anthonies fire.

Take of Burre rotes, and of Sage leaves, and braye them berie well, and make therof a plaister which you must lave boon the fore.

A verie excellent remedie against winde in the left side, called in Italian Melancholia mirachiale.

Take of red Rose leaves sire ounces, of Ciperus five drams, of Cloves, of Asarum, of Passitick, of Spicknarde, of eche sire drammes, of Pace, of Cardamomes, of Putmegs, of eche one dramme, braye and mire them togither: Then take of Myobolanes

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robolanes called Emblici one pounde, the which you must bople in feuen pintes of water, butill two parts therof be confumed, frame it and put buto the decorion one pound of Dony, then bople it againe, butill it be as thicke as Hong, then put it buto the fpices before mentioned, and mire them togither with a watter made of Willow, or of a Pomecitron tree, and aromatize it with halfe a scruple of Puske, and ble it in electuaric.

## Another for the fame.

Take of Capillus Veneris, called in English Paiden heare, of Buglotte, of Reisons, of cche one handfull, of Lignum Aloes, of Spicknarde, of Masticke, of eche two drammes, of Epithimum, of Wolfpoole, of Borage, of eche halfe an ounce, of the fuice of Pome ropals, one ounce and a halfe, of Sugar two pounds, make therof a firop, and aromatize it with white Amber, and ble it.

To remedie the want of sleepe through frenche.

Daue away the heare with a Kaler, and annoint the heade with the froth or fome which fwimmeth byon Creame, and be thall fleeve forthwith.

To heale the falling ficknesse.

Take of the Lungs of a Molfe, and walke them with god red wine, then bople them, and dreffe them with Cordiall fpices, and give it in meate buto the ficke person, and he thalbe healed: or elfe take of Opoponack, of Castoreum, of Sanguis draconis, of Antimonie, of ech like quantitie, bray them and give therof buto the licke person two scruples, in what mar ner you will, and this thall be the quantitie whenfocuer be taketh it, and you shall see the successe there to be maruellous.

To heale the trembling or shaking of the members.

A Propert the crowne of the heade and the places that are grieved with ople of Cinnamonde, and cause the diseased person

person to take two drammes of the water that is made of mans or Swines bloud, brought but o putrifaction with Aqua vitæ, and after distilled, and of this you must give him to drinke many times in a Moneth.

To remedie the teares, or itch of the eyes.

Take of Aloes Epatici, two drammes, infuse it in sweete wine, and of Rose water, as with the rest will fill a Cup: and ther with washe the eyes, or else somentate them with the water of Steeados.

To heale the founding of the eares.

Take of the leanes of pighthade, and taking out of the inice distill there into the eares. Also take & oile of Irinum, mired with Ainegar, and put thereof hote into the eares. Likewise take Eleborus halfe sodden in Ainegar, and being put into the eares, it healeth the paine. Also take the inice of white onyons, and mire it with like quantitie of hony, and put there into the eares. The like effect is done with the inice of Leekes mired with inomans milke, and put there into the eares.

To remedie the yoxe or hicket.

fearce them, and make a lectuarie thereof with home of Rofes, as much as fuffifeth, of the which you Mall cause the person to take everie morning, one ounce. Then annount the backe, and the place of the raines with Triacle, and Role water, mired to: gither . It helpeth also to take fasting one dramme of this confection following. Take of dried Kew ten drammes, of Ameos, of Commin, of Origanum, of Derfeley, of bitter Almonds, of Depper, of Calamint, of Daucus, of long pepper, of Calamus Aromaticus, of eche two drammes, of Way berries, of Talko:, of gum Serapine, of Opoponacke, of eche three drammes, make a lectuary with hony: the which hath not his like to diffolue windinesse, or bentositie.

## To remedie the Flixe of the bodie.

Take a quantitie of the middle red barke or rynde of a Cheffnut tree, and boile it in water butill two partes of the tree be confumed: and give that which remayneth but the ficke perfon to drinke.

Another for the same.

Take of Apytle berries finely beaten twelne drammes, of Rose leanes, of Spodium, of Sumacke, of the three kindes of Saunders, of Balaustie, of gum Arabick, of ethe one dram and a halfe, of the ryndes of Pomgranats burned seuen drammes of Coriander sedes infused in Aineger and burned source drammes of Sozell sedes, of Plantin, of Roses, of ethe two drammes, dray them and wash them with the surre of Agresta, or of Austres, and Aineger, then drie it and after mire the powders with the mina of Aninces and Aineger, and make thereof a Leanarte.

It is in ble also to take two partes of sea water, and one part of god white Wine, and a dramme of the powder of the rynds of sowre Pomegranates, and being mired to make thereof a glisser, and it will heale the griefe.

To remedie the griefes, and inueterated fwellinges of the knees.

Take of Goates dung, and mix it with the meale of barly, and make a playffer with Minegar and water, and put it by on the swelling.

To take away swellings after the Goute ceaseth.

Take of the ashes of burned Dyster shelles, and of the ashes
of Spongses, and of Dodder, as muche as you thinke god,
boyle

boyle them in Charpe wine with a little water, and therewith wath the fixte: but first you must fomentate them with a piece of a militone burned and quenched in bineger. It helpeth also to somentate the place with the decoason of frichworte and to emplaisfier the same.

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them with Cinamond beaten, mired with hony. Also take the greafe of a Ducke in the which is mired washed Litarge, and annount the place, and it worketh the like effect.

Take of Calomus Aromaticus one pounde, bray it a little, and infule it in a sufficient quantitie of Tinegar, and then boyle it in that same Tinegar butill halfe therof be consumed: then Araine it well thosow a linnen cloth, and put buto the decoction of god hony fire ounces, and Loyle it butill it come to the substance of a sirrop: wherof you must ble to take morning and evening fast png, the quantitie of an ounce and a halfe, at a tyme, and you thall have your defire.

Against the excoriations, and griefes of the bodie.

Take of the herbe called Alchimilla, brage it and take out the inyce by a linnen cloth, then take of Gallitricon, and of is an herbe Hipericon made in powder, and being medled, give thereof to dainke. De else take of chosen Agrick two drammes, binde it in a linnen cloth, and bople it in water, with Mallowes, Tiolet leanes

Take of Taxus Barbatus, and of the flowers of Pimpers nell, of flower Deluce, as much as you please, boyle them in wine, and being taken out, emplayfer the place about his Fundiment, and it will returne but othe place.

### To heale streynings.

Take of Bafill, and boyle it in Ainegar, and Dyle, butill it be berie tender, and with the decoaion bath the place.

Against the belkings of the stomack.

Take of the flowers and rindes of Pomegranets, and beate them into ponder, then boyle them in Uinegar, in the which you must infuse a sponge, and with bathing the stomacke the paine will cease.

### Against Chilblaynes, or Kibes.

Take the rines of Pomegranets, and braye them well, then boyle them in wine, and being well beaten, put it byon the griefe, and you shall see a berie trim effect.

Against hardnesse of the Milt, and of other members, and the Palsey.

Take of the graine leanes of Bearefote, eight ounces, of Sar uine, of Hage, of Pallowes, of Pargerome, of Rolemarie, of of Pulegium, of Potherwort, of Wormelvode, of Sothernwode, of eche two handfulles, of cloues fire ounces, of Cinamonde halfe an ounce, of Commin two ounces, of Calingale, three drammes, of Incense, and of Passicke, of eche source drammes, of white Ware, eyght ounces, of god wine three pintes. Boile all these a foresaide things butil the wine be consumed, then take it from the fire, and put buto it the ware, and make an Dyntment, with the which annoynt where node requireth.

To remedie the griefe of the loynes and bellie.

Take water Pintes and drie them, and make pouder therof, and give two drammes of that but the licke person to drinke in three ounces of the water of Radilhes, and you that see a happie successe.

To heale the pimples in the face.

A proint the face with the oyle of the feedes of Bombace, and it will clenfe the face from the speckes of pumples.

Against windinesse of the Bellie.

Take of Annis liedes, of Fenell liedes, and of the rotes of Bruscie, and of Suger, of eche like quantitie, make pouder thereof, and give but the sicke person a sponefull to drinks in god wine, and it will heale him.

To cause a woman to anoyde the skinne that the childe is wrapped in, called in Italian Secondina.

Take of the flowers of Parigoldes, and being died make pouder of them, and put thereof about a great ware candell, and being lighted make there with a fumigation but hir place of nature, and it will doe the effect.

An excellent preservative against the Pestilence and Dropsey.

Take one ounce of the innce of graine nuttes, of the innce of Agrimony halfe an ounce, of the inice of Rew three drams, of the inice of Jope three ounces, of the inice of Hempe foure ounces, meddle them togither, then take of the faide mirture halfe an ounce, of Mumia halfe a dramme, of Sugar Candy halfe an ounce, of Sugar Rosate one dramme, make a leanartie, of the which, disolve in god wine the quantitie of a Chestenut, or else in Buglosse water, or of the flowers of Marygolds, and many nights when you go to bed, vie to drinke therof.

To remedie the yexings of the stomacke and vomitings, and losse of appetite, occasioned through cold humors.

Take of the fædes of Cardamomes, and of Lignum Aloes, like quantitie, and being finely beaten, drinke a dramme thereof in god swæte wine two houres before you cate meate, and if you adde therebuto Annis sædes, it will restore the appetite which is lost.

To heale the Quarterne ague and all agues, which by nature continue long time.

Take of Cardus benedictus, one dramme, and being made in pouder, you shall cause the pacient to drink it a quarter of an houre before his fit take him, then couer him well in his bed, and you shall see a maruellous effect: or else give him to drinke three ounces of the water of the same herbe distilled in Paye, it will cause him to sweate abundantly, and cease his paine.

#### Against the Pestilence.

Take of the rotes of Tormentill finely poudred, one dram: of Triacle halfe a dramme, dissolue it in Sorrell water, and give it but the diseased to drinke.

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Gue but the fick person one dramme of the pouder of Top: mentill rates to drinke with god red wyne, and in taking it oftentimes he shall be healed.

To restore the appetite that is lost.

Take of the leds of Spire Trifolie, & boile them in wine, and give the licke person to drinke therof three dayes continually, morning and evening, and presently after, give him to drinke a dramme of powder of Tinger, dissolved with vinegar, then cause him to be well covered in his bed, the shalbe whole.

To take spots away that grow in the eyes.

Boyle in wine the flowers and rotes of Walerian, and diffill of that wine being cold into the eyes, and you thall the a prefent fuccesse.

Against the pleurisey.

Diffill in the miost of August through a Limbeck the rotes of Claterian, and bathe in the water paces of Linnen cloth, and put them hote byon the cuill: also if you give the pacient therof to drinke, it will heale him.

A medicine for women which through fatnesse can not conceyue.

Take of the herbe Bettonye, and make it into pouder, and give but the woman one dramme to drinke thereof, in halfe an ounce of the water which is distilled of the same herbe, and it will doe the effect.

Against the Hemerodes:

Take of the wood of Times and make after thereof, and being disolved in bineger, annount the place oftentimes and it will heale them, or else take of the stope, or caulking which they

they take out of olde thippes with the Piche, and being put into a hole with coales make thereof a finoke, and cause the ficke person to sit thereon and he shall be whole. It helpeth also to boyle the seaves of Colewortes with water and butter, and let the pacient sit over it to receive the summe, and he shall be healed.

#### Totakeaway Warts.

Take of the water which distilleth from the Wines, at suche time as they be cut, and with that mire the water which is wont to remayne in the leaves of Dkes, and walke them of ten therewith.

#### To remedie the infection of the fkinne.

Take of the rotes of Aines, and boyle them in water with the fiedes of Fetches and Fenegreke, and therewith walh the place.

#### To accelerat the birth.

Take out the supce of Time leanes, or else boyle them in god whyte Thine, and give fourcounces thereof but the woman to drinke, eyther of the one, or other.

### To remedie the Quinsey.

Take out the meate of an Drenge, and fill it with Hennes bounge, then put therebuto oyle of Roles and a little Saffron, and boyle it boon a fyze of coales, and when you have taken it from the fyze, bray it and make thereof a playifer, and binde it buter the throte, having first well purged the bodye.

#### To heale the Cough:

Take of Typentine, and of clarified Hony, of eche like quantitie, and being mired with an Egge somewhat sodden, give to the pacient to dinke.

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To make a leane person to become fat. Take of the feedes of Orobo, and after you have dived them at the fyre brave them, and mire them with Dony: and of the mirture you thall give buto the ficke person every morning the quantitie of a Aut falling, or else take of the meale of Amidum, and of Sarcocolla of eche fine ounces, mire them with Butter and make thereof a paste, the which you shall bake bus tyll you can make ponder thereof: of the which ponder for the space of many dayes, give ten drams at a time buto the person to brinke.

#### To make a fat person become leane.

TAke foure ounces of warme Hineger, and put therein a quantitie of the pouder of Depper, and give it buto the pare tie to drinke many mornings falling, and he will become leane, or elfe give him to drinke enerie morning of the Wine of fower a medicine Pomegranates, two fcruples with Oximell, or water.

Oximel is made of homy and water fodden togither.

To heale Wartes or harde knobbes.

Ake of the alhes made of the wood of a Whyllowe, and mire it with the sower pulpe of a Ceder apple, and make thereof a playsfer, and lave it bypon them and they will be healed. It helpeth lyke wife to annount them with the bloud or dounge of a Katte diffolued in bineger, oz elfe with water of the wood of Ulines, that commeth of them when they are burnt in the fyze: or else rub them oftentimes with the leaves of Porcelane.

To heale the Cough.

Take of Lynesedes, and put them into a warme Cup that they may drie, of Replons the Cones being taken out, of ech four counces: of sweete and bitter Almondes, of Pine kernels mundified, with two ounces of rolled Autres, of the rotes of Ireos, of Kolpn, of cche two drammes: of Incense, of Pastick, of Ayerha, of Saffron, of eche one deanune, braye them all, and with the milke of an affe, make little rounde cakes of rolles

and

and being dried make pouder therof, and with hony make a lectuarie, of the which you shal give but the pacient a dramme at a time with a littell small wine, morning and evening, and let him keepe a little therof continually buter his tongue.

To remedie the cough of children.

Take of sweete Almonds blaunched, as many as you please, braye them well, and dissolue them with Fennell water distilled through a Limbecke, and putting Sugar therebuto, boyle it butill it become thick, and give it but children to eate.

To take white spots from the nayles.

Take of quicke Sulphur, and being brayed, mire it with Aurpentine and Pitch, and put it boon the nayles: or else put thereon of Myrcha beaten with liquide Piche, and it will doe the effect.

To remedie the flegmaticke humor in the bladder and reines.

Take of the herbe called Linarea, the rotes and flowers, and boyle them in water, and give the ficke person to drinke, of the decoation four counces, morning and evening, and it well consume the sleume in those partes, considering notiviths and bing, that such a remedie helpeth when the discending of the humors in those places, happen through a colde cause, and not of a whote.

To remedie the flix of vrine.

Take the rotes of the herbe aforefaide, and hear them well, and put them in maner of a plaister betweene the nauill, and the lower place of the belly, and it will heale it.

To remedie the Dropfey.

Take the rotes of the herbe called Hirundinaria, of some it is called Asclepiade, and being brayed, insuse them a F.iii. whole

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whole night in wine: then boyle them butill the thirde part be confumed, a give but the diseased partie everie morning foure ounces thereof to brinke, and causing him to be well covered in his bed that he may sweat, you that see a marvellous god effect,

To remedie the griefes and bloude retayned in the Matrix.

Boyle the forelayde herbe in white Wine, and taking the fume therof from beneath, allone as the woman chalbe taken from the fire, you chall lie an expedite profe.

To heale the burnings or inflammations of the goute.

TAke a quantitie of the meale of Barlie, of the fædes of Duinces halfe as much: byay them and mire them with binegar, and lay it boon the griefe.

To heale the Ptificke, or an olde Catarre, the cough and other defectes of the lunges.

Take of Mope one handfull, of drie figges foure, of Reive a little, boyle them togither in water and a little honie, and of the decocion being warme, give a glasse full but the sicke person to drinke fasting.

To procure the birth of dead Creatures, and to remedie the stingings of venemous beasts.

I p the beginning of September gather the berries of Junipet, when they be rype, and being a little brused, distill them thorow a Limbeck, and give the woman source ounces to brinke therof, and you shall see the effect.

To remedie all the passions of the sinewes.

Take Lauander, and cut it berie small with his slowers, and being distilled through a Limbecke, give two ounces at a time to drinke of the water that shall be gotten therof: washing the head also with the sayd water, then drie it, and it will helpe berie much the sinewes.

To heale the itch.

7 Ake of Lapacium acutum, or of Sozell, and boyle it in water, and wall ther with the discased person : or else take of the rotes of Laurell, and being wel braved with Salt and bread, annoint ther with the bodie. The like effect is bone with the decoaion of Agrimonie and Sage, made with raine was ber, and washing therwith the licke person.

To remedie the paines of the stomacke and of the milt, and the windinesse of the body.

Take of the liedes of Louage, of Cinnamond, of Rapontici, of Galangale, of eche like quantitie, and with Sugar make a confection into little tablets, and give thereof buto the ficke person, making him to drinke a little wine after it, and it will worke a verie god effect.

> To heale the griefes and hardnesse of the milt.

TAke of the rotes of white Lyllies, of Beare fote, of marthe Mallowes, of eche three ounces, brage them and boyle them in halfe a pent of ople Dline, butill it become thick, then Araine ft thorowe a linnen cloth, and putting therebuto War, make an Dyntment, with the which you shall annount the place of the griefe or fivelling, warming it morning and evening.

To comfort the brayne, or to heale the Apoplexia, and the Collick.

Take of the flowers of Lyllies that grow in the playnes, fuch ries or refquantitie as you will, and infuse them to become tender in fels of the Mine, by the space of source wickes, then casting away the braine, and dowers, distill the Wine fine times, of the which you must therfore drinke a little with fire graynes of Depper, and a little Lauan deprineth der water, and you shall be safe from the Apoplexia. And was of feeling, thing therewith your forchead and the hynder partes of your speech and

Apoplexia is a sicknesse engens dred of große humors filling thereceptohead mouing.

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head it comforteth the brayne, and cauleth a good memorie, and the quantitie of a sponefull thereof, being dronke healeth the paynes of the Collick.

To remedie the whyte flixes, and coldnesse of the Matrix.

Take Pargerom and distill it in the ende of Pay by a Line bech, and cause the woman to drinke of the water that shall be gotten therof the ounces at a tyme, and she shall be whole.

To heale the Collick and difficultie of pyssing.

The of the leaves of Poarehound, of the flowers of Kolemaric, of Liquerice, of Perfely feedes, of ethe halfe a handfull, of Keylons, of Prunes, and of Luiubes of ethe one ounce, of the foure common hote feedes fine drammes, of Kadilhes foure ounces, boyle them with water and a little wine of Pomegranates, until halfe be confumed, then strayne it, and with Sugar make it pleasaunt, of the which, cause the sieke partie to drinke two ounces at a time.

To heale the comming out and prefocation of the Matrix.

Take a quantitie of Balme leaues, and daye them, and cause the woman to drinke thereof in broth or wine, 4 the thall be healed. It helpeth also the presocation of the Patrix, to take the water that is distilled of the said herbe, and to drinke therof.

To drive away the heavinesse of the minde, to accuate the senses, and to make a good memorie.

Take Balme and braye it, a stipe it till it become fost in god wine in an earthen bestell well covered and stopped, then distill it by a Limbeck, and every morning give but the sicke person a sponefull to drinke.

To remedie the congelation of the milke within the brests.

Take of the leaves of Pintes, a boile them in as much wine, and oyle as thall be lufficient: and being taken out, brage them and laye them boon the hardnesse in maner of a plaister.

To heale the falling of the Vuula.

Take of Rew, and of Coriander feedes in pouder, and boyle them in water of Pintes, and with the layde water being colde, cause the ficke person to gargarise, and he chall be hole.

Against fulnesse of the stomack, and Ptisick.

Take and boyle a Capon, and with it a handfull of the herbe Apercurie, and take a potinger of the booth, and put there in some sugar, and give it the sicke partie to drinke, and it will heale the griefe.

To remedie the retention of the skin called Secunda, and to cause the auoyding therof.

Take a quantity of the herbe Percurie, and bray it, and with ople of Roses or white Lillies, mire it well, and make a Pessarie with a piece of fine Linnen cloth, and applie it buto the necke of the Patrix.

#### To heale Warts.

R The the Warts with the herbe Percurie, or with the inice therof, and they shalbe healed, or else with the herbe Purces lane.

To stop the flix of bloud in women.

Take a quantity of the herbe Hilfollie, and bray it, and being put into the place of nature, you shall see a present remedie: or else put hote Millium into a little bag, and cause the woman to holde it but hir hippes, and the paine will cease.

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To stop the white flix of the Matrix.

Take of the flowers of the herbe Eruca, and beate them into ponder, and mire therewith the like quantitie of the herbe called Poule eare, or Chickwiede, and of Origanum, and with halfe the quantitie of Sugar make a lectuarie in little rowles, and cause the sirke to cate thereof: or else boyle the leaves of Trifolic in wine, and give thereof to drinke: or else of the water of the said herbe distilled in Paye. The water of deade Pettles, the quantitie of their ounces being dronke, both heale the like infirmitie. The like also is done by a somentation made but of the lower parts with the decoction of the most of trees.

### To heale a quarterne Ague.

Take of Asarabacca one dramme, and make pouder therof, and give it but the sick partie to drinke in white Wincone hours before his fit take hun, for within a shorte space it will purge him eyther bewardes or down chards and heale him.

#### Against the Ptisick.

Take of Filipendola rotes, and of Gentiane, of eche one dramme, beaten into ponder, ble to drinke thereof manye times in water of Hony, and it will heale you.

#### To remedie the rednesse of the face.

Take of the leanes of yong Fennell, of olde Swines greace, of ethe lyke quantitie, mince them well together with a knyfe, then braye them a little, and at night annoynt the face: and in the morning washe the face with perfely water, and it will worke a verie god effect.

#### To heale the Sciatica.

Take of Strawberies, four e handfulles, boyle them in as much water as shall suffice, and bathe therewith the place

of the griefe, and after annoynt it with this opntment. Take of Vnguentum dealthea, one ounce, of Hony, halfe an ounce, of Ware, one dramme, mire them and make an opntment thereof, which by bling will make a maruellous effect.

### Against wheales or blisters of the face.

Take in the midst of spring time of the leaves of an ashe tree, bray them, and let them stande to mollisse five dayes in Tieneger, then distill them in Balneo Marie, and with the water washe contynually the face the space of three weekes, and it will be whole.

### To recouer a lost appetite.

Take of Galingale, of Depper, of Partily lades, of eche two drammes, make pouder therof, and with newe Hony make a Leauary: of the which take morning and evening, the quantitie of a sponfull, two hours before meat.

#### To take away moles or spots which children take in their mothers believe.

Take in the Moneth of March the rotes of Aueus, togither with the leaves, and being brayed, diffill them thorows a Limbecke, and with the water that thall be drawen thereof, walh often the spots, or Moles, and they will be healed.

#### To heale the yelow iaundice:

Take of Artemelia, of Scolopendria, of eche one handfull, of Morminod the third part of a handfull, boyle them in white wine that is not tharpe, neyther tweete, butil the thirde part be confumed, putting the Morminod buto it in the ende, and adding ther buto of Sugar, cause the sicke partie to drinke foure ounces therof continually the space of nine dayes every morning in steade of a strop, and he shall be healed.

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To remedie the griefes of the heade, which through the beating of the artiers, doe not fuffer one to take fleepe.

Take of Warmwood well braved and boyled in water, and binde it but his temples byon the griefe: which prefently will mitigate the paine, and cause him to take a pleasant large.

To heale the Ptifick occasioned of groffe and viscous humors.

Take of Gentian, of Calamus aromaticus, of ech halfe an ounce, of Arithologia longa, one ounce: beate them into fine pouder, and mire therewith honge of Roles, and make a leauarie, of the which you thall give but the ficke person a sponefull, in the Honning two howes before he cate meat, and you shall see a happie successe.

Against grauell or any other viscous matter ingendred in the reynes.

Take of marthe Pallow rotes foure ounces, of Butter one ounce and a halfe, of hony the ounces, of raine water as much as sufficeth, beave the rotes, and putting energy thing into a possenet, boyle them butil the rotes be well sodden, and being taken from the fire, straine it through a linnen cloth, or learce, and cause the sicke person to drinke sire ounces thereof fasting, let him ble this certaine dayes, and you shall see a berie happie successe.

To drie vp the milke of the breftes.

Take a new earthen pot to boyle with, and annoint it with oyle Dline, and put therein as much Typpentine as you please, then set it to the fire, and let it boyle a little: after put in to it two pieces of linnen cloth, which may drinke by the Turpentine, then spread them byon a bord, and put bypon them of the ponder of Olibanum, and apply them but the break where the dugges begin, and you shall have your purpose.

To

To heale children that have wormes.

Take of Alocs, of white Diptamus, of Centian, of worme feede, of eche one scruple, of Butter as much as sufficeth, make therewith an opntment, with the which you must fill halfe a Auts thell, and binde it boon the nauill of the childe, and in one night it will remedie him, it is a thing well proved.

To mitigate all kindes of griefes.

A fter the Poneth of Pape is palled, take of the coddes that Clines bring forth among their leaves, and take out the water within them, and put it into a beffell well fropped, and fet it in the funne twelue dapes, then annoint there with every part that is gricued, and it will make a happy fucceffe.

To cause milke to discende into the brefts.

Take of the herbe and feeds of Dill, boile them with Lentils, and give the broth therof to drinke, and it will cause a mars uclous effect : or else give hir the offe of Annis leedes with Fere nell fædes, and you shall have a god successe.

Against yexings occasioned through cruditic of the stomacke.

The Annis leedes boyled in wine and then difed, put there. buto of Cinamond, and of Masticke, of cche like quantitie: and being made into fine pouder, ble it in your meates as a medicine that hath bene proced.

To remedie the stinking of the breath, happened by eating of Garlicke, or suche like meates.

Take a quantity of the rotes of Béetes, and roll them in hote embers, and being eaten, they will do the effect: or elfe for the like cause give the partie to eate raw Beanes, of Rew.

Against

# The fourth and last part

To heale the bitings of mad dogges.

Take of the leanes of figtrees, of the flowers of Camonill, and of Garlicke, of eche like quantitie, brage them, and applie them plaister wife byon the euill.

To prouoke the flowers vnto a woman.

Take of Labdanum as much as sufficeth, make thereof a Pellarie: and mire therein of the pouder of Pyrha, and of the inice of wake Kobin, and applie it but the place of nature, and you shall see a berie god successe.

An excellent remedie against the dropsey.

Take of Assarum one ounce, infuse it in a little Barrell of sweete wine by the space of three Poneths, then straine it, and cast away the Assarum, and give of the wine to drinke morning and evening but the sicke person, and you shall see a marvelous successe.

Against the falling ficknesse.

Take of Labdanum, of Cassia lignea, and of the suice of Womwood clarified, of eche one scruple: braye them to gither, and make thereof their pilles to take one houre after supper, and ble to doe the like many times.

Against the weakenesse of the stomacke through colde.

Take of Cassia lignea, of Pasticke, of Fennell sedes, of eche halfe a dramme: and being beaten togither, make a pouder, and give it to drinke fasting, being disolved with the fuice of Wormwood.

To remedie the defire to vomit, and to restore the appetite that is lost.

Gather Centoxie the letter, at such tyme as it beginneth to slower, that is in the end of June, theing minced smal togical ther

ther with the flowers, diffill it through a Limbecke, and of the water which hall be diffilled, give the ounces but the ficke person to drinke thereof morning and evening falling, and it will heale him. It healeth also the Collick, and causeth the proceeding of deade creatures.

Against the bitings of all venemous beasts.

Take an Dnyon, and braye it with freshe Kewe, Salt, and Hony, of ech like quantitie, put it byon the biting. And it is maruelous.

Against the mistes, droppings, and rednesse of the eyes.

Take of the flowers of Cherie trees at their time, distill them in Balneo Mariæ, and put of the water into the eyes of the diseased, morning and evening colde, and it will worke the intent.

Against the hardnesse and swelling of the liver or milt.

Take Juie and make it tender by infusing it ten dayes in wine, butill it become rotten. Then boyle it butill the wyne be consumed: Arayne the suice, a mire it with oyle Dlive, and ware, a make an oyntment, where with annount the swellings.

To purge the Matrix of a woman.

Take of Cum Serapine, of Pyrtha, of Cichoric, of eche like quantitie, braye them, and with oyle of Camomill, and horny, diffolue them, and make therof a plaisfer, and having made a suppositorie, put it into the place of nature.

#### Against the Ptisick.

Take of Saffron one scruple, of Puske halfe a graine, mire them, and dissolue them in god wine, and give it but the sicke partie to dinke.

To

To remedie olde inueterate griefes of the head.

Take of Gum Arabick, of Apperha, of Saffron, of Euphorbium, of eche three graynes: brage them all togither, and mire them with the white of an Egge well beaten, then applye therof unto the temples and forchead, and prefently you hall have helps.

Against Hemerodes that appeare not.

Take of the herbe Cinoglossa, and distill it by a Limbecke, and of the water that shall be taken thereof, give but o the diseased to drinke the quantitic of these ounces in the morning, and he shalbe hole, but if they shall be apparant and come forth, wash them often with paces of cloth bathed in the same water, and they will be healed.

Against drie choughes.

Take wilde Daucus, and boyle it in wine with the rotes all so, butill they be thosowly sodden, putting therebute a little quantitie of daie figges: then firaine it, and give the sieke person to dainke of the wine oftentimes, and he shalle healed.

To remedie the griefe of the Hemerodes, and the chappings of the fundiment.

Take of Bole Armenick, of Sum Arabicke, of Palticke, of Sanguis draconis, of Appreha, of die Roles, of the flowers of Pomegranates, of eche this drammes: make of all these a pouder, then take of fresh butter one ounce, of ople of Roles this ounces, of the suice of the leaves of Leckes this drammes, of the suice of Filopendola four counces: set the suices, butter, and ople but o the fire, and boyle them buttll the suices be consumed: then put therebuto the other things being beaten into sine pouder, and make there with an oputment to annoynt the gricte.

An other for the fame.

Take of the greate of a Ducke and of a Den, of eche one ounce, of ople of Roles two ounces, of ware thee drammes, of the pelkes of raine egges one, of Opium in pouder one diamme of Saffron balfe a diamme, mire them all togither, and make therof an opniment.

> To heale the windinesse and other passions of the Matrix.

Take of Gallia muschata, of Labdanum, of putmegs, of Caftor called in Englishe a Beuer, of the rennet of an Hare, of Bdelium, of eche two drammes, of Bave leaues, of Spikenard, of Malticke, and of Mirtell beries, of cche two ouncer, of Oleum Nardinum, fire ounces, of ople of Buts megs one ounce, of white ware thee ounces, distoluc the ware with the ople, and put therebuto the other things being finely braved, and in the ende put bnto it the Putmegs, and make an opnement without fire, and making rolles of Piche annount them with this opniment, and put them into the concepuing place of the woman.

To remedie the disease of the pleurisey.

Take of the flowers of red Poppie, which grow amongst Wheate, and drie them in the Sunne, and having made them into pouder, give a little therof buto the ficke in his meats and drinkes. Then annoint the place of the griefe with ople of Lifartes being warme, and you thall fix the effect.

To heale the disease called Tigna.

TAke Puts with their thels, daie them bypon a Hearth, and make them into pouder, then mire it with olde Larde of a fetb the fwine without falt, and there with annoint the griefe, and pres beare of the fently it will be healed.

Tigna, a discase which canbeari or bead to To fall amay.

To remedie the griefe of the breftes, and to caufe milke to discende,

Take of Percely rotes, and of the rennet of an Parc, of ech halfe an ounce, of Storax calamite, there drains, of new oils of tweete Almonds thee ounces, of Barly meals one ounce and a half, make ther with a plaister, and lay it upon the brefts.

Against water and windinesse in the testicles of children.

Take foure rotes of white Lillies, of Line fiedes, of Beanc flowers, of eche one ounce, of Comin, of Daucus, of eche foure drammes, of Brimstone one dramme: of the fruite of Ciperus halfe an ounce, of Bdellium distolued in binegar two drammes, of opic of Camomill fire ounces, boyle the rots and dray them: and with the water of the decoaion boyle the meale, and miring all togither, make a playster, and applie it colde but the griefe.

To heale scabbed hands occasioned through the French disease.

Take of the leaves of Pettles one handfull: of Cinamonde, and of Cloues, of eche two drammes: boyle them in water, and bathing the handes in the fume therof, they will be hole.

To stop the superfluous bloud of the flowers.

Take of the herbe called Virga pastoris, and make it in pour der, and give two drammes therof to drinke in a potinger of the broth made with Peason, and it will stoppe: or else boyle it in binegar, and being brayed, applie it bnder the nausl, in maner of a plaister, and it will worke the like effect.

To heale shronken and stiffe sinewes:

Take of Ceruce, of Rosin, of olde oyle, of eche one ounce, of Sum Amoniack, of Galbanum, of the confection Ciphodea,

phodea, of eche one ounce; of ware foure ounces. Pake an ointment and ble it.

To remedie the euill countenance which proceedeth of the Dropfey.

A fter the body is well purged, the ficke must take morning and eneming before meate, one of these morsels following. Take of the pouder of Dia lacca, of the pouder of Dia curcus ma, of eche one dramme, of the seedes of Southisse two drammes, of Lignum Aloes, of Cloues, and of Saffron, of ech halfe a scruple, of Sugar fine ounces: dissolve the Sugar with water of Agrimonie, and make the confection into rolles, enery one conteyning one dramme and a halfe.

To remedie the euill colour of the face.

Take of the rotes of Turneps, and of the rotes of Acorus, and being walhed, distill them with a Limbeck, and of the water that shalve drawen therof cause the sicke to drinke five ounces at once, continually the space of sistene dayes before meate, and you shall see a verie god successe.

Against the inflammation of the liver.

Take of the fuice of Endine three ounces, of the fuice of Lt.
uer wort two ounces, of mundified Tamarindes fir drams,
of red Saunders in pouder one dramme and a halfe, of fine
Sugar as much as sufficeth, distolue the Sugar, with the Tamarindes, and make a lectuarie: of the which, the sicke partie must take one ounce energe day.

To remedie the mistes or dymnesse of the fight.

Take of Kape leedes, and make Comfets ther with, as you to of Annis leedes, of which the licke bling to eate, thall finde maruellous eafe: or else take of the alhes of the heads of Swalowes two drammes, of god Honie three ounces, of the fuice of Fennell one ounce: put them into a viall of glasse covered H.iy. close

close at the top, then boyle it in Balneo Maria butill halfe be confirmed: and of that which remayneth, drop into the eyes early in the morning, and a little before supper, and at night when he goeth to bed, let him bie this cuerie day.

### To remedie the want of hearing.

Take of white Eleborus, of Salmiter, of Caftoreum, of eche one dramme, of Timegar, of god Hony,
of eche one ounce: boyle all these togither, and dipping therein
a locke of woll, put it warme into the eare.

#### Against the trembling of the hart.

Take of Cloues, of Cinamond, of ech two scruples, of white Ben and red, halfe a dramme, of Saffron halfe a scruple, of Traines, of Ginger, of Salingale, of eche halfe a scruple, of Jacints, of Smeralds, of Saphires, of the bone of an Harts hart, of eche one scruple, of Tolde leaves sire, of Pargarites preperated two drammes, of Conserve of Roses, and of Busglosse, of eche one ounce and a halfe. Beate into powder everye of the foresaide thinges by himselfe, then put them altogisher into a Porter with halfe a pounde of Sugar, and put therebused halfe a pound of the sirop of the rindes of Teder apples, and make a lectuarie, of the which, the sicke must take early in the morning, and at after none, and one houre before he sup, the quantity of half a sponefull at a time, and after it, let him drink two sponefuls of wine aromatized that is sweete and pleasant.

Against the impediment of smelling.

Take of the leedes of Nigella infused in vinegar one ounce, being first dried in the Sunne: of Castor, of Autmegs, of ethe one dramme, of the sedes of white Ben, and red Ben, of Balingale, of white Pepper, of Origanum, of Calamint, of ethe two scruples: of Costus, of Serapine, of Kew, of Balis sedes, of ethe one ounce. Pake pouder therof, and binde it in a fine linnen cloth, and smell often onto it.

### Against wormes in children.

Take of Totes milke halfe a potinger, and quench therein a piece of burning Iron. Which milke being given but the childe to drinke, will cause him to anophe the wormes from beneath.

### Against great and swollen gummes.

Ause the partie to keepe many times in his mouth the inice of Purcelane: or else the Brine of white Dlives, which are not ripe, being warme: or else let him holde in his mouth oyle of Lentils. After this it availeth to sprinkle the gummes with the pouder of the rust of Iron or Copper: or with the pouder of Plantine seedes.

Against the opilations or other defectes of the liver.

To heale the comming forth of the nauill of children, and the ruptures within them.

Take of the herbe Perfoliaton, and braye it, and put it bpopon the nauill of children oftentimes, and you shall set the effect. The like effect is sene, if you take a pecce of sinnen cloth and being burned, to lay it by on the nauill with a little oyle Deline. The ponder of the sedes of the said herbe given in wine, or in milke but ochildren, healeth the ruptures within them.

I If the be without an Ague, and knoweth the griefe to proceed of ventolitie. Take of Pullarde fiedes, or of Kape fiedes, and boyle them in water, and ther with make fomentation but the place. But if it happen through inflammation, or through euili purging, with an Ague, cause the woman to drinke a dramme of the powder of Pionie rotes in broth: or else boyle in broth of the flowers of Camomill, and cause hir to drinke therof.

Against the prefocation of the Matrix.

Make pouder of the leanes of Gourdes, and take a dramme thereof, and being discolved in god wine, give it hir to drinke, and at everie time that the drinketh thereof, the thall finde a marvellous effect.

Take of oyle of Auts, of the inice of furniterre, of ech thee ounces: with the are make an oyntment, with the which, after he is walked, if the diseased be announced, he will be hole.

To remedie olde fores of the legges.

Take of Aristologia longa, and of Aloes Epatice, of rehe one ouncermake them into powder, and with Hony of Koses worke it into a passe, and put theref upon the sores, but before it be applied therebuto, mundifie them with oyle of Tartar, or with the decoation of Ayrha, and within sewe dayes he will be hole.

Against the hardnesse and stiffnesse of sinewes occasioned through woundes.

Take twelve frogges, of Swines greafe, one pounde, of oyle of Bayes two pounde, of Bay berries made in pouder two ounces, of white incense in pouder one ounce, boile all these togither butil the bones of the Frogges be seperated from the seth, then straine them thosow a linnen cloth, a make an syntment. Wherwith annoynt the diseased member at night when the partie goeth to bed, and then wap it with the skin of a dog. And in the morning washe it with this decoason following. Take of the rotes and leaves of Agrimonie, of the rotes of Pallowes: boile them in water butil they be tender, and wash the member oftentimes there with, and you shall have god successe.

To take out thornes or any other thing fastned in the fiesh.

Take of the rotes of the herbe Narcissus, and of the meale of Cockell, as much as you will, braye them and mire them with Hong, and put them on the cuill.

Against impostumes and griefes of the Hemerodes.

Take a white onyon well rosted in the embers, make it bery cleane, and being brayed, mire it with the meale of Fenergreke, of Linsedes, and of Camomill solvers as much as sufficeth, and put therebuto a little Butter, and source graynes of Saffron, and lay it byon the gricse. It belieth also the paynes of the eares caused of colde or grosse humors.

To stop the bleeding of woundes.

Take of the herbe called Alchimilla, and of Sanicola, of eche one handfull, boyle them in raine water: then take of earth wormes brayed, and strained thorow a linnen cloth insto the decoaion. Take of Alchimilla, of Fennell, of Sage, of Perdy, of ech one handfull: of Annis leedes, of Fennell, of Flope, and of Euula Campana, of eche two ounces: boyle all these in two pintes of water buill the thirde part bee consumed, and drinking oftentimes of the saide decoason, you shall se a maruel lous experience.

To remedie festered and instamed woundes.

Take of the inice of the herbe called Pinipernell and of Semperaine, of eche halfe a pounde, of oyle Dine one pounde: put them all into a bestell to boyle, butill halfe be consumed, then put therebute of Butter source ounces, of Acrderame halfe an ounce: make there's berie persite oyntment.

To heale woundes wherein were fastened thornes, or other such like things.

Take of the tuice of Pimpernell that beareth red flowers, and mire therwith of Diptamus, and of the from Calamitis, and make a plaisfer with Swines greafe, and applie it but to the wounds, and you shall have your intent.

To remedie cankers in wounds.

Take of the rotes of Brusci, and make pouder therof, which being put into the wounds will heale them. De else put by on them the tuice of Parygoldes the greater. De the herbe Taxus barbatus burned and made in pouder, and so layde by on the Cankers.

To remedie the Kings euill.

Wathe the fore and wartes with the decoaton of the rindes of Caphers: then take a Herpent, and having cut away his head and tayle, put the other part into an earthen pot that hath

hath holes in the bottome, and being well luted both aboue and beneath, put buto it an other pot as a receiver, which you thall cause to stand boon a pot filled with water, which shall boyle fo long butill the Serpent be distoluted into onle, buto the which adding the pouder of the rotes of Capers, annount the griefe eight daves ther with, and it thall be healed.

Take of Passicke two ounces and thee drammes, of oyle of Moses, and of ware, of eche one pounde, of the marrowe of an Part one pound, of the fat of Chickens one pound, of the fat of a Downtwo poundes, of the Poucillage of Fenegreke nine ounces, of Linkedes, and of the inice of marth Pallowes as much more as of them all: of Lamonnil a little bundell, of Dill seven little braunches. Bray the Passicke, and being mired with oyle of Roses, boyle it with a soft fire, and mire the inices with the ware in an other vessel, then straine them all, and put therebuto the Passicke with the oyle of Roses, and mire them at the fire, putting therebuto the wore. And being taken from the fire, put the ointment into a bessel of glasse. Which you must apply in maner of a plaister.

Take of the leaves of an Dike, and braye them well with which often

Sope, and laye them on the griefe: or else bray marsh Dale breedeth in lowes with Barrowes greate and crummes of bread, and lay ones singues, therof boon the eufl. It helpeth also to annount the place with the filth of the eares. Also it healeth to take Reysons, the kernels taken out and brayed with Incense, a last boon the griefe.

Against the chappes of the fundiment, and spots in the face.

Take of the ople drawen out of the feedes of Bombace, and bath often the place of the fillures therwith. It helpeth likes wife the blackenelle and spots of the face. Also the powder of a dogges head burned and layo thereon, healeth the said griefe.

Against the swellings and fores of the Hemerodes.

Take of Terebinthe one ounce and a halfe, of Biroclime two scruples, of Tutia of Alexandria this ounces, of Litarge of Silver, of Ceruse, of Coperous, of eche two ounces, of Plantin size drammes, of olde ople one pounde, braye those things which are to be brayed, and then mire them togither, and with the saide mixture annoint the place butil it be healed.

To remedie the flix of the bloud of the Hemerodes.

Take the inice of Liekes and give thereof but the lieke to drinke: or else annoynt the Hemerodes with the fat of a Swan. It helpeth also to burne a spunge not washed, and being made into pouder, to give thereof but the sicke to drinke: or else to cause him to drinke of the reunet of an Hare or of an Hart in strictive water.

To heale the swellings of a mans yarde,

Take the fat of the repnes of a theepe, and put therebuto the pouder of a pummace from burned, and of fait finely beaten in pouder, and put thereof byon the swolne a soze member.

To

To heale deepe fores in the legges.

Take the gall of a Swan, of Turpentine, and of Teruse as much as you please, and being well medled, annoynt the place often therwith: or else take the bones of the Jawes of a Swanne, or of an 190g, burne them, and lay of the ashes bron the sore.

Against the griefes, sores, putrifaction and stinch of the cares.

Take of the fuice of Kew, and bode it in the rinde of a Pome, granate, and distill thereof into the eares: or else mire the gall of an Dre, or of a Tote in a bestell of earth, and being made hote byon the embers, put therof into the eares. It helpeth also to take the gall of a Tote mired with the milke of a Towe, and put warme into the eares.

To heale chappes in the heades of the brests or teates.

Take of the thell called Blacce Bizancie, and burne it, and mire the aihes with Butter, walhed with Role water, and put therof byon the fore, and in thort space it will heale them.

To heale fores of the legs happened through scaldings.

Take of olde oile thee ounces, of white ware, and of Teruce, of eche two ounces, of the fat of a Wether halfe an ounce, of Minium, of Lye, of eche halfe an ounce, of Sanguis draconis, and of Camphora, of ech three drammes. Hire them all togither, and make a Cerote according to Arte.

To heale a west growing on the eyeliddes.

Take drie figges and boyle them in wine and Hony, then braye them well, and put therebute a little Galbanum, and lay theref byon the cuill: or else put theren of Castor distoluce louth Hony: or of the ashes of a burnt Swallowe mixed with Hony, and he igall have his intent.

To take away the griefe of the eyes which happeneth of a stripe.

Take the yolke of an Egge, and mire ther with yoke and oyle of Koles, and closing the eye, laye byon it a perce of lynnen cloth dipped in the same mirture, and it will be hole: or else washe the eye with the water that procedeth from grane willowes when they be cut, and it will worke the like effect.

Against chappings of the lippes, and of the heads of womens brests.

Take the braine of a Twfe, and meddle it with the braynes of an Hart, and annoynt the lippes: or elfe take of Litarge of Silver, of Apreha, of Tinger, of eche as you pleafe: and make thereof powder, and with Hirgin ware, Hony, and oyle Plive, as much as sufficeth, make an opntment, which will be marvelous. But before you lay on the ointment, wash the lips, with spettle, and then with a little piece of linnen cloth lay the opntment byon the griefe.

Against chappes vnder the tongue.

Take Inke and mire it with the pouder of Hermodactiles, and laye it boon them. And in the beginning take Sal Armoniack and beate it finelye, and laye of the pouder bypon the griefe.

Against a Fistola growing in a womans brest.

FIrst wash it daily e with warme wine, wherein hath bene boyled Ayarha, then take of Sarcacolla, and of Aloes of ech as you please, and being brayed, mire them with Honge, and having made therwith a little bag, put it into the Fissola. Laking hede, that if it heale not, you put but it the gall of an Hen, or of some other creature, and leves of olde wine, and with this, most certainly you shall have your purpose.

To remedie the impostumation of a mans yarde, and windinesse of the bottome of the bellie.

After you have done the butwerfall regiment of letting of bloud, annoynt the member with Aloes discourse in wine. And to drive away & ventositie of the belly, vie to fomentate the place with the water of the decoason of Aristologia rotunda.

Against hot impostumations of the testicles.

Take of the meale of Beanes, of the meale of Barlye, the leaves of Penbane, of eche as you please, braye them and mire them with the sayde meales, and oyle of Roses, and laye them byon the soze.

Against colde impostumations of the testicles.

Take of the pulpe of Keylons, of the meale of Beanes, and of the power of Commin, meddle them with Honge, and make a plaister: or else take wide Calamint brayed with Lesuen, Salt, and Butter, and make therof a plaister. It helpeth also to emplayster the place with the meale of white Cicers mired with Hong.

Against the discending of the intrales into the purse of the testicles.

Take of Acatia, of the nuts of Cipies, of Markeron, of dife Kew, of Bay berries, of Galles, of Gum Arabick, of eche twentie diammes, diay them and fearce them finely. And if he be of a ripe age, make a plaisfer with the glew of a fishe disolved in binegar. If it be a childe, make the plaisfer with the Spucillage of Phillium. And let him dinke wine tempered with the decoation of Cipies nuttes.

To remedie a rupture or breaking.

Take of the filing of From, of the heares of an Hare, of ethe one ounce and a halfe, of Cipies nuts this diamnus: of Life. Mun-

Mummia, of Sanguis draconis, of Incense, of echone dram. Wake Pilles therof with the funce of Billifollie: of the which, give but the sicke person a dramme or somewhat lesse at a time, after his age. And at night when he shall take them, lay be bon the rupture a plaine pace of Lapis calamitis.

To draw bloud from the Hemerodes.

Tand lay it boon the Hemerodes. It helpeth also to put theres on the inice of Dnyons with the gall of an Dre.

To stop the flix of the bloud of the Hemerodes.

Take an Gle, and having taken out the guts, cut of the head and taple, and referve only the middle part, and being well walhed, bear it and put it into a possenet well leaded, and let it boyle, pressing it often downe with a spatter, and gather the fat which shall come thereof, with which annoynt the Demerodes, and cast bypon them the powder of Filopendola rates, but if the Demerodes doe not appeare, bip a locke into the sayd fat, and sprinkle it with the sayde powder, and put it into the sandiment.

Against rupture of the hands and feete caufed through colde.

Take of the fat of a Bearc, and annoint the griefe therewith, or else take sea Crabs and burne them into ashes, and mire therwith Hony, and annoint the soze. It helpeth also to annoint with Hony mired with the hose of an Asse burned into ashes.

Sandarack dried is verie good to remedie the same griefe: or charabe, is else Charabe brayed and dissoluted with oyle of Roses.

To close vp wounds.

Lage boon the woundes pouder made of the leaves of an Dke, and presentive they will be hole: or else take the sources of Taxus barbarus brayde and layde byon the sore. It helpeth

belieth also to boyle the tender toppes of Jupe in wine, and being brayed to lave them bppon the woundes in maner of a plaister. Also the leanes of Talillowes braged and lapde bppon the woundes, doe heale them.

#### To generate fielh in wounds.

Take die Piche, and make thereof fine pouder, and put tt I byon the fore. The like effect both the powder of Incense, or Juie, given by themselves : or the pauder of Polley of the mountaine, or the leanes of the Dinetre, or of an Clime.

#### Against brusings within the flesh and armes.

That here percent fresher or Orobo in wine, wherein first hath bene becomed Saffron, and being brayed, ble it as a plaister oppon the stripe of bruse. It anapleth also to annount the place with ople of Acubarbe. Drelle to lave the leaues and rotes of Enula bpon it in maner of a plaifter.

#### Against the shrinking of sinewes.

Take Salt and Brimstone brayed, and being medled with Dony, lave therof byon the griefe. It availeth also to drinke a dramme of the tuice of Gentian tempered with water: 02 else to make an Imbrocation bpon the place with the becomion of Sumack. It remedieth also to make a plaister of meale and Dony, and to lave byon the griefe : or else the pouder of the fromes of Replons mired with binegar, and therewith to ans noint the place. The like effect is done to emplaifer the discased place with Rewe well brayed.

### Against the hurts of the sinewes and arteries.

Take Dysters with their shelles, and braye them, and adde thereto of Ayrthe, of Incense, and of Fig dust medico to gither, and lave therof upon the fore. It helpeth also to take and brage the flesh of ground Snayles, and being medled with fig built o lav it byon the hurt. To

To heale the prickings or cuttings of finewes.

Take Salt and boyle it in oyle, putting therebuto of Tur, pentine, and so laye it boon the punture, and it will prohibit thrinking: or else laye boon it this plaister following. Take of Diaquilon one pound, of Gum Ammoniack, half a pound, of Bassicke, and of Jucense, of eche one dramme: of yelow ware halfe a pounde, and therwith make a plaister. It remedieth also the swellings of the smewes, to take the sleshe of a Ducke, or the gall of a Wolfe layd byon them in maner of a plaister.

Against paine of the sinewes.

Bathe the place with warme lye, and give the partie thereof to drinke, and the paine will cease.

To ease the paine of wounds,

Take of the meale of Lupines, and of Barlie, of eche lyke quantitie, and with warme water or lye, (if it be in a place of linewes,) make a plaister, and laye it thereon.

Against the superfluous fiesh of wounds and wormes of the same.

L Aye boon it the pouder of Assa ferida, and it will take it as waye: or else take the ashes of burned woll, and lay it there on. It helpeth also to take the pouder of wilde Talamint, or of Scordeon which will consume the flesh, and cause the wormes to die.

To take away the blacknesse of wounds.

Take of the inice of Rew, and mire it with Hony, therewith annoint the place, putting therebuto of the gall of an Dre. The like effect is done by taking the fat of an Alle and annointing the place therwith: or else boyle in Hony a piece of freshe Chiefe without Salt, and put it byon the wound.

#### To remedie the disease Panaritio.

Take the blossomes of wylde Ames with Nigella, and therwith emplaymer the place. It helpeth also to laye byon it the fuice of Liquerice.

#### To open ripe impostumes.

Take griene Pettle liedes, and Salt, and being brayed to gither, put it byon the Impostume. The like is done by taking the yelowe part of the dung of a Cocke mired with the yolke of an Egge and a little Saffron, and layd byon the Impostume: or else take the rote of Narcissus, and being brayed with Hony and Peale of Orobo, make a plaister and vie it. Also the dung of a wood Done mired with Peale of Cockle, and boyled with wine, being layd byon an Impostume, doth open the same.

#### Against festred cankers.

Take of Inke, of Auripigmentum, of quicke Bumfone, and of Halt Gemma, of eche like quantitic, dissolue the forelayde thinges in vinegar, and put them into an earther possenet that is not glased, and close it well that the sume maye not go forth, and boyle it buttil it become ashes, then make ponder of it, and wash it with vinegar that is warme, and put of the sayd pouder uppoin the sore, presently at the quenching. And after, lay of this simtment upon the sore. Take of red Hong claristed, of the sat of a Gote, of the filings of Copper mixed therwith, and so make an opntment.

To heale fores that are moyft and hard to close.

Take of the tops of Figtrees, burne them a make after there of, or infuse them in water certagne howes. And being strained, put but of treshe ashes, renuing it in such sort divers times. And with the said water washe the sayd some estentimes a daye, and put of this powder following byon it. Take of the Lity.

The fourth and last part 2+

athes of Dyster spelles two drammes, of Aloes Sicotrine braved one dramme, and put therebuto of the aftes of Sea Urs chins, and medle it togither with Swines greafe, and pou thall fee a good fuccesse: or else put into the wounde the slowers at fiedes of Dill burned, and they will doe the like . Alfo it hele peth to take the herbe Virga pastoris, and brap it, and then to put therof into the wound.

Against fretting fores. Take of oyle of Kadishe rotes, and of Salt, bray them togic ther, and lay them plaister wife byon the fore.

To heale fore tetters.

Cinabrium is that which is milion.

Take of ware, of Cinabrium in pouter, and of ople of Ko I fes, as much as thatbe fufficient. Dake therof an ointment: De elfe bear Cockle and Brimffone, and mire them with Wie called Ver- negar, and make an oyntment.

A verie excellent water for tetters.

Take of Roche allum, of Sal niter, of ethe one ounce, bap them into pouder, then strapne them thorowe a linnen cloth, of quicke filner one ounce, working it beric much with a pestell. Then put it into a Still of glasse with a long necke, and heate it at the fire, butill it begin to bople, then close well the mouth of the Still, and let it bople butill it cease of it felfe. Then take it from the fire, and let it cole, sprinkling it with ffrong binegar, after let it buto the fire agains to boyle, and breaking the bellell take out the pouder within it, and take of the fuice of Telenoine purified at the fire, and of firong bincs gar, of eche halfe a pounde. Deble all rogither, and being boys led, diffill them through a felt. And referve the water to kyll tetters. The like effect is done to washe the place of the Kings wormes or tetters in the evening when you go to bed with was ter of Aurpentine distilled, with holoing at his face a veric fine cloth. In the morning walh it with warme Perap water, and then with Rose water, and the effect will be maruellous.

Against

Against burnings or scurfes in the face, which appeare like vnto a Leprosie.

Take of quick Brimstone one ounce, of Camphire one dram, of the bones of a Cuttle one ounce, of the marrow of a Calfe two drammes, braye them all seperately by themselves, and meddle them in a pounde of Kose water, and halfe a pounde of the water of Lillies, and set it in the Sunne, stirring it everye day with a sticke, and therwith annoint the sore.

#### An other.

Take of Litarge one ounce, of Camphire and of Ceruce, of eche one once and a halfe, of quicke Brimstone one ounce, of Camphire one scruple: of Sivines grease that is freshe and strained two ounces, of the suice of Duinces one ounce, brape those things that are to be brayed by themselves, and then meddle them all in a Porter, and keepe it in a bessell of glasse butil you will occupie it.

To heale fore legges.

Take of Coltes fote, brave it, and lay it bppon the fores: or else take the inice of Agrimonie, and wathe therein pieces of lunnen cloth, and put them bpon the lores, and presently you shall see the experience.

To heale legges that are hard, swollen, and fore.

Whealed, make a furnigation but the legge with Termistion and Incense, as they vie to doe but the French disease, filling your mouth with The ine, and keeping the leg coursed, that it maps receive the perfume, and by ving it so two extenses the most, it will be hole.

To heale the burnings of fire before they bladder.

Walh the burnt place often with colde lyc: or else annount it with Hong, but if it be loze, annoint it with Holy. 1. Inke,

Inke, and it will be hole: of elle take afthes of the dung of Piegeons burned, and mired with oyle of Holes and wave, as much as is sufficient, make thereof an oyntment, and laye it boon the soies.

To heale one that is fallen from some high place.

Take colde water and drinke therof presently: or else take a dramme of the powder of Bittonie, and drinke it with war ter. It helpeth also to take of Lacca, of Apyrha, of Saffron, of eche two drammes, of Fenegueke, of Castor, of eche halfe a dramme: of Bole Armenick three drammes, bray them into powder, and give thereof to drinke oftentimes with wine well mirt with water.

To heale one that with a fall hath hurt one of his members.

Take of Branne, and of Salt well brayed, and with Ponye make a playfer, and put it boon the fore: or else make powder of the barke of a Pine træ, and with oyle of Pirtels, and ware, make an oyntment.

To preserue a member that is striken, from impostumation.

Laues of Sumack, and you that have your intent.

To take away the fignes that remaine of blowes or stripes.

A Propert the place with the fuice of Radishes, or else with Hong, in which is dissolved the seedes of Radishes brayed. It helpeth also to annoynt the place with Honge and Salt medled togither.

To heale brusings of the nayles.

Take Onyous and mire them with the fuice of Warlie boys ted, and lay therof upon the fore: or else bray the sedes of wilde

wilde Hintes, and with Hony make a liniment, and if there be put onto it Linfedes well brayed, and layd opon the nailes that be brused, they will be hole.

To heale fores proceeding of itch in the naturall places of women.

Take of the tender leaves of an Dlive tree, and of Juic, and of a Bremble, and of swate Pomegranates, braye them well and disolve them with olde wine, then take a price of fresh raive slesh, and cover it with the foresayde leaves being brayed, and so let hir keepe it in hir natural place one night. In the morning let it be taken out, and walh the place within with the decoason of Pirtels made with wine, and doing thus, with in sciw-dayes the will be hole.

Against the fores of the mouth of the Marrix happened in procreation.

Take date Role leaves brayed, and washe them with wine, and annoint ther with a suppositoric made of the heaves of an Hare, and put it into the Matrix, and wash it with a charpe Lotion.

Against burning fores of the Matrix of women with childe.

Take swite Almonds brayed, and mire them with the mare row of an Dre, and boyle them in water, putting therebus to a little meale, and being colde, annoynt the Battir within therwith. And after walh it with the decocion of Pirtels.

To heale the prickings of the finewes.

The hurts of the fine wes happen cyther through ffripes, or bicause they are pricked, or some with some sharpe thing, or that they are cut with a sworde or knife, or some suche like instrument, and through the sharpe seling thereof they cause men to incurre into verte great paines. If therefore the sine we won.

be pricked or Arichen, it is necessarie to open the place with two Graite incisions, to thende the humoz map iffue out, and if the bodie be full of bloud, then must you let the beine bloude, but if it be full of euill humors, it is necessarie to purge it, but if there be made no incition, the paine may be mitigated, by giving if fue buto the putrified matter, in bling fomentation buto the place nigh buto the pricking, with ople of verye ripe Dlines that is as hote as maye be fuffered: oz elfe lay bppon the place warme Aurpentine, in fuch perfons as are of tender complete tions, but in frong bodies, and of hard fleft, lay byon the place the pouter of Euphorbium mired with olde ople: or elfe take of binegar nine ounces, of liquide Diche one pound, of Oppoponack two drammes. Diffolue the gum in binegar, and mire ther with the Wiche, and lav it boon the punture. It helpeth ab to to take quicke Brimstone with olde Leuen, or the inice of Wertworth with the faide Leven lapde byon the fore. Dr the dung of a wood Doue, or Scrapine, put bppon the punture. Taking bede, that if the place of the punture doe not putrific, to ble this Cerote following, videlicet. Take of olde ople one ounce, of ware thee brammes, of Euphorbium, one bramme, mire them and worke ther with. You may also lay byon it Propolios by it felfe, and it will much anaple, if the finewes be bered with inflammation, to that they putrific, put bypon them this Cataphalme. Take of Barlie meale, and of Beans meale, or of Orobo, and boyle them with Lie, and Oximel, and lay it byon the inflamed member. If the member be bucos ucred through the wound, it can not then fustaine the fard mebicines bicause they are very tharpe. It thall be necessarie therfoze to put bpon the wound Lime that hath bene oftentimes walhed, and diffoluce with a good quantitic of cloe oyle: o: elle Turpentine of the firre tree, with the leaves of Centorie the leffer, braped and mired togither: or elfe put thereon the opnts ment called Tutia simplex, but if the wound be belozous, bath the places about it with olde ople that is warme, and lay bpon it buckane woll, or ople mired with binegar. Hundiffe the mounds

wounds with well dipped in fodden wine, or else ble these rolles diffolued in fodden wine. Take of Allum thee drammes, of Incense halfe an ounce, of Wirrha one ounce, of Vitriol tivo drammes, of the flowers of Pomegranates one ounce and a halfe, of the gall of a Bull fire drammes, of Aloes one ounce, and make therof little palfels with wine.

An excellent and precious oyntment to heale the rupture of the fcull.

Take of Oppoponack, of Bdellium, of Ammoniack, of eche thee drammes, of Kolen, of Gun Elemi, of eche one ounce, of Olibanum, of Apprha, of Sarcacolla, of eche one dramme and a halfe, of ople of Roles foure our ces, of Ware two ounces. First disolue the Summes with Uinegar, and fraine them: in the ende mire with them the other thinges finelye made in pouder, and make thereof an opintment.

#### To mollifie hardnesse.

Take of the relidence of Oleum Irinum, of oyle of white Lillies, of ople of Sifamine, of ople of floete Almondes, of eche one ounce, of Saffron in pouder one dram, of the greate of a Badger one ounce, of white ware two ounces, of Kolen foure ounces. Pake a Cerote according buto Art.

> A most precious oyle to heale a wounde in xxiiii. houres.

Take of the flowers of &. Johns wort, of the flowers of Kolemarie, of ethe one hanofull, put them togither into a glatte, and fill it with perfite ople, and close well the mouth of the glatte that no aire go out, then let it france in the funne, the space of thirtie dapes, in clere nights also. And when the ople thall have gotten the colour of the flowers, frame it, and put unto it of Gynger one bram, and a little Saffron billolued in god wine, then let it in the Sunne againe the space of rbits. Dayes, M.UJ.

dayes, and annoynt the woundes with the layde oyle being warme, twyce a day, and you hall have your effect.

Against spitting of bloud, through rupture of a veine.

Take of the fuice of Plantine, of the inice of Pumpernell, and of Burla pattoris, of eche fire ounces, of Bole Armenick one pounde, of Gum Arabick burned, and of Gum Dagagant, of eche one ounce, of Amilum, of Sanguis draconis, of Terra figilata, of Acatia, of Spodium, of Hipoquistidos, of the beries of Pirtels, of ech ten drams, of glew of Parchment, made with finite of lower grapes two ounces, boyle the inices with the forelayde things brayed: in the ende put them into the Porter, a worke them a god space togither, putting thereby to the whey, a make an opniment thereof to annoynt the brest.

#### To heale fores of the legges.

Take of the lewet of a Wether fire ounces, of ople of Koles, of eche two pounds, of Tinegar eyght ounces, of news Ware, ten ounces, of Litarge brayed four ounces, of I erebinche, of Kolin, of eche two ounces, bray altogither in a beffell butill the binegar be confumed, alwayes frirring it with a ficke, butill it become a Cerote.

#### An other for the same.

Take of Eurpentine thrice wathed with Sozell water, foure ounces, one raise pelke of an Egge, mure them well, and put therebute of the inice of Smallage foure ounces, and boyle it butill it come buto the forme of an oyntment. Then take of Aristologia, of Centaurie the lesser, of Gentian, of eche two brammes: pouder them and make an oyntment.

Against all inflammations of the reynes, and the running of them.

Take of ople of Sisamine, of Molets, and of Moles, of eche one ounce and a halfe, of Ceruoc, of Olibanum, and of Massick,

Malfield, of eche one dramme, of Camphire one scruple, of the meale of Amilum ten drammes, of Rose water one ounce, of whites of Egges twelve, of white Ware fine ounces, of Bole Armenick ten drammes: distolue the Ware with the oples, and when it is colde, mire the other things that are in powder, and make an ointment to annoint the reines.

#### To heale fores that are inflamed.

Take of burnt Leade one pounde, of Litarge brayed one ounce, of Ceruce washed halfe an ounce, of binegar, and Hony of Roles, of eche one ounce, of ople of Roles three ounces, of the yolkes of raw Egges three, make an ointment in the morter and ble it.

#### Against stripes or brusings.

Take of the rotes of Consolida the greater and letter one pound, of the meale of Beanes source ounces, of Camonil, and of Pellilot, of eche two ounces, of Butter three ounces, of the suice of Mornivod and of Comin, of eche one ounce, boyle the rotes butil they be tender, then put but o them the other things, and bray them well, and make a platter, and laye it byon the sore.

To heale the Panaritio, and every other griefe which happeneth vnto the endes of the fingars.

Take of oyle of Pastick, of oyle Dline, of eche two ounces, of Antimonie one dramme, of Ceruce washed, of Leade burned, of Tutia preperate, of eche halfe a dramme, of white Ware one ounce, of white Turpentine of the Pinetrée was shed thrice with white wine one ounce. Dissolue the Ware with the oyle and Larpentine, and then put unto them the other things that are in pouder, and make an ointment.

To heale scurfe or scales in the head, bearde, or browes.

Take of the leaves of an Elme when they be tender, have them, and with a presse get out the suice, with the which an noint the sore, and it will be hole sor certaintie.

To remedie the scorrications of children through occasion of vrine, or of some other sharpe humor.

Take of Litarge brayed one ounce, of opic of Miolets the ounces, of the whites of Egges one, of the inice of Plantine, and of Semperature the letter, of the fire drammes. Pake an ointment and firre it well in the Porter, and annoynt colde all the gricles that come of heate as rawnesse of thin and such other.

To remedie the running of the reynes occasioned of a sharpe cause, and to heale the scortications which they make.

Take of the fuice of Virga pastoris, of the inice of Plantine, and of the fuice of Compherie, of ech two ounces, of Camphire one dramme, three whites of Egges: of the meale of Amidum two ounces, of Ceruce one ounce, of Litarge halfe an ounce, of Incense preparated with Kose water fre ounces, make an opniment in a Porter of Leade, and being colde an north the parde buder the string.

To remedie spots and markes, and to take away all superfluous growing of flesh in any part of the body.

Take of the rotes of wilde Cucumbers, of white Apil, of the rotes of Coloquintida, of ethe one ounce, of Ceruce, of Litarge, of Tartar, of ethe one dramme and a halfe, of the rotes of Canes that are greene, of Scrapine, of Pigrons bung,

dung, of eche two scruples, of oile of Sisamine, of oile of wheat, and of Juniper, of eche one ounce and a halfe, of white ware two ounces, of the inice of Dienges soure ounces, of the whites of Egges one, of Camphire one diamme. Braye the rotes and boyle them with the oyles butill they be almost tensor, and then straine them. Then take the inice of Dienges, and the Camphire, with the white of the Egge, and mire well these things together, then put the ware into the said oyle, and when it is disolved, let it stands to cole, and in the ende meddle them altogether, braying those thinges that are to be brayed, and make an opintment, with the which annoynt the place warme, and it will doe the effect.

#### To heale fores of the brefts.

Take of Hony fire ounces, of the meale of Barlic one ounce and a halfe, of the yolkes of raw Egges two, of Apprha, of Sarcacolla, of die Koles, of ethe one dramme, boile the meale with Hony, then put but it the other things in pouder, 4 ble it.

#### To make oyle of Balme, which hath these vertues following.

TAke of clare Aurpentine one pounde, of white Incente foure ounces, of Bum Elemi fire ounces, of Bay berries foure ounces, of Palticke, of Valingale, of Cinamonde, of Clones, of Autmeas, of Cubebes, of eche one ounce: bear the foresaide things groffely, and mire them with Aurpenting, and put them all into a Stillitorie of Classe with the recepuer, and distill them with a little fire, there will come fouth the first water, and the seconde of much value called Baime was ters, in the ende will come forth the most perfect called Balme. This ople healeth wounds, especially those of the linewes, the Canker, Fistolaes, Lepzosie, and the disease called Noli me tangere, in touching the place twice a day with the faide oyle. It healeth a Carbuncle or Woch, and all kinde of Poplon. And being put into wounds, it bringeth out broken bones, and bear R.J. leth

leth ruptures, and annointing the temples ther with, it helpeth the memorie.

To heale wounds of the legges happened of scaldings.

Take of oyle Dlive thee ounces, of white Ware, and of Cestuce, of eche two ounces, of the fewet of a Wether one ounce and a halfe, of Minium, of Lie, of eche halfe an ounce, of Sanguis draconis, and of Camphire, of ech thee drammes, meddle them all togither, and make an oyntment, and lage it byon the forc.

#### To close vp woundes.

Take of ople of Roles, of grane ople Dline, of eche fire brammes, of ople of Birtils, of V nguentum populconis, of eche three ounces, of Plantine leaves, of Solatrum, of eche two handfulles, bray the herbe and mire every thing togither, Airring them well every day, in the ende Arayne them thorow a Boulter or linnen cloth, and put but the Arayning, of ware four ounces, and discolve it at the fire, Airring it with the spatter, and while it is warme, put therebut of Litarge of igolde and of filver, fire ounces, of Brasse burned three drammes, of Ceruce two ounces, of Camphire one dramme, of Turia presparated two drammes, of burnt Lead fire drammes. Which them in a Porter of Lead the space of two howres, and make an oputment, bling it with god successe.

To heale fores which through drie distemperature of those parts cannot be healed.

Take of Barlie water fire ounces, of Pallowe leanes boyled in water two ounces, of meale of wheat halfe an ounce, of the polpe of Almonds brayed two ounces, of clarified Pony one ounce, of Saftron half a scruple, of Swines grease a little. Braye them all and make a plaister, then take of oyle Pline two ounces, of Turpentine halfe an ounce, of Ware as much as sufficeth, make a liniment: first put of the liniment into the

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fore, with pieces of linnen cloth, and boon that put the plaisfer, and within thost space you shall have your intent.

To remedie dolorous fores of the ioynts:

Take of oyle drawen out of ware by Alcumiffrie, and of oyle of yellowe ware, and put thereof into the fore, and it wyll worke a maruelous effect: or else put about the sore, cloutes dipped in oyle of Brimstone boyled, and it will doe the effect.

To remedie brusings and fores happened of stripes, or otherwise.

Take of Turpentine walhed fire ounces, of white Ware fine ounces, of Palitick two ounces, of Mernice, of Sarcacoll, of Kolen, of ethe one ounce, beap those things that are to be beaped, and having made powder, disolve the Turpentine with the ware, and put thereto the powders, and make an opniment.

To heale the hardnesse of the feete.

Take of the Pucillage of marth Pallow feedes, of the Pucillage of Colewort feedes or Cabifhes, of eche one ounce, of the fat of a man, of the fat of a Beare, and of a Orege, and of freshe Butter, of eche halfe an ounce, of Ware as much as sufficeth, make a soft opintment and annount the knobbes.

To remedie dolorous fores happened through colde distemperature.

Take of Turpentine two pound, of Brickes or boyled fromes fire ounces, of Pastick, of Storax, of ech one ounce. Burne the Brickes and quench them in oyle, and being brayed, mire them with the other things, and distill them by a Limbecke, the first liquor that commeth forth will be water, the seconde and thirde will be oyle apt to heale such sores: or else ble in this case oyle of Turpentine by it selse, and it will make a very hap sie operation.

To

To take away superfluous flesh which groweth in woundes.

The intent of the Philition is to drie it by with medicines which doe not fret, as with Tutia, Antimonic, Galles or barke of Incense, these sayd mettals being washed and decoco ted, bathe first the fiesh with this decoction, and then you may applie them buto it. Take of Jucente, of Ballicke, of eche one dramme, of Role leaves, of Birtils, of Rew, of eche halfe an ounce, of Sage halfe a handfull, of Roche Allum one dram, bople them in water and walh the flesh ther with, and then put on the ponder about written: and if you can not drie it with the faid remedies, take of water of Plantine, of Roles, and of Rightshade, of eche foure ounces, of Opium one scruple, of crummes of breade two ounces, of Argentum Solimatum, foure scruples, worke the Sublimate well bypon a marble, then mire all togither, and boyle them butill halfe the water be confirmed, then fraine it thosow a groffe linnen cloth, and put the three or bagges, and lockes into the faid water, boyling them a little, and then expresse it somwhat, and reserve it to put bpon superfluous fleshe that groweth, butill it be consumed.

To heale fores that happen thorow wormes.

Take of Teruce, of Polij montani, of eche halfe an ounce, of liquide thip Piche, as much as sufficeth, mire altogither in a morter, and make a liminent, considering that if the wormes be generate through the cuill habite of the bodye you must be be beiverfall medicines to consume the superfluous humbitie, as by letting of bloud, and by drinking water of Guacum, and bypon the sore put Vnguentum Rosatum with Precipitate, or Vnguentum Apostolorum.

To heale fores happened of broken bones.

Take and brave the routes of Dog Fennell oried, and marking ponder thereof, put it into the fore. Likewise the rotes

of Ireos, of Aristologia rotunda made in pouder both helpe them: or else take Oppoponack with water of Sulphur, and touch the broken bone therewith, and it will sequestrate it, and cause the bone to come forth.

To remedie the gummes of the French disease.

Take of the rotes of wilde Tucumbers, of the rotes of Ireos, boyle them butill they be tender, of the which take one
pounde. Then take of Ammoniack, of Serapine, and of Galbanum, of eche two ounces, of Storax liquida one ounce and
a halfe: of the fat of a Beare, of Butter, of eche one ounce, of
quicke filter not extinct two ounces, make a plaister and put it
byon the gummes.

#### To kill wormes in children.

Take of red Cozall, of the meale of Lupines, of the horne of an Hart burned, of Nigella, of eche one scrupte, of ople of Roses, of ople of Moses, of ople of the mall into an Dzenge, being made hollow at the top, and boyle them in hote embers: then expected it, with the which expection arrownt the stomack and nausll of the childe, and put upon it the rinde of the Dzenge rosed, and you shall see the effect.

#### Another for the same disease.

Take of Aloes Cicotrine, of the rotes of white Diptamus, of Gentian, of Morme feede, of the feedes of Purcelane, of ethe halfe a dramme, of the gall of a Bull halfe an ounce, of Scammoney one scruple. Bray them and mire ther with Butter: with the which fill the chelles of two Puttes, and binde one byon the fromack, and an other bypon the naull. It will kill the wormes, and cause them to anoyde beneath.

A verie precious water for divers infirmities.

Take of Cloues, of Hunnegs, of Binger, of Paces, of Set well, of Galingale, of long Pepper, and of rounde, of the P.iy. sprigges

fprigges of Juniper, of the rindes of Teder apples, and of De renges, of Sage, of Baldl, of Rolemarie, of Pargerome, of Mintes, of Bay berries, of Pulcgium, of Gentian, of Calamint, of Cloer flowers, of white Roles and red, of Spike, of Lignum Aloes, of Cubebes, of Tarbemomes, of Tinamond, of Camepitios, of graines, of Calamus Aromaticus, of Mal tick, of Olibanum, of Aloes Epatici, of baie figges, of thep: fons, of the feebes and leanes of Doll, of the feebes of Artemeha, of Dates without fromes, of Iweete Almondes, of Pine hirnels, of ech one ounce, of Dony the weight of them al. 15:ap them and mire them with Aqua vita thrice the quantitie of all the reliduc, and put them into a Still well luted, and let them infuse the space of two daves, and put bnto it the Recipient, and lute it well, putting it buto the fire : then chaunge the Kes civient after ve have drawen the first and second water, which bane one felfe bertue, that is to heale the wounds being applied bnio them with paces of linnen cloth, they heale also the Cankers, the Fistolaes, Carbuncles, & the disease called Noli me tangere. And putting a drop thereof into fore eyes, within the space of nine bayes it healeth them. And a drop being bronke with white wine, healeth the disease of the reines. It helpeth ale to the Demerodes, walking them with the land water. It hele peth the griefes of the Watrix by brinking two brammes in broth, walking with the favo water all the places that are fore through any colde cause, and contraction of the sinewes, and it bealeth all colde infirmities. The thirde water that shall be brawen, will be of a red colour, and thereof must be ministred continually the space of halfe a sponefull at a time. It belyeth Leprofies, Dropfies, Ptifickes and the colde Coure.

An oyle like vnto Balme, very profitable for divers fores.

Take of clere Eurpentine. iii. pound, of Incense, of Lignum Aloes, of ech three drammes, of Bastick, of Cloues, of Car Engale, of Cinamono, of Putmegs, of Cubebes, of Cum Elemi,

mi, of ethe two drammes, brave those thinges that are to be braved, and put them into a Still of Glaffe, and let it fettle the frace of fine or fire daves. Then diffill it boon the embers, first with a foft fire, then encrease the fire so much that al the things be diffilled. And taking it out put it once againe to diffill in an other Stillitorie, cauling it to frande in infusion, and having fet the Still in Balneo Maria, pou thall diffill the liquois: the first will be a clere water, and will swim oppermost: the fecond liquoz will be an ovle through more diffillation, and putting thereto a sufficient quantitie of fire, you shall get out the thirde ople. The lapde ople with announting, helpeth fore fi newes, and by annointing Cankers and fistolaes ther with. it helpeth them berie much, and with touching the fores, it causeth them to close bp . It helpeth the Lepzosie, the Carbuncle, and drinking a drop or two in broth or in wine, it healeth the passions of the Matrix, and all inward griefes, it draweth out perified bones, being put into the wounds, it healeth them, and annointing the temples, it maketh a god memorie.

Against superfluous winde in the left side, called in Italian Melancholia mirachiale, and the disease called Sincope.

Take of red Roles thee ounces, of Ciperus two drams and a half, of Cloues, of Pattick, of Spikenard, of Afarabacca, Swounding. of eche one dramme, of Daces, of Cardamomes, of Outmegs, of eche halfe a dramme, bray energe thing, and put thereto of Myrobolanes Emblici halfe a pounde, boyle all togither in foure pounds & a halfe of water, butill two parts be confumed, then Araine it, and put therebuto of Hony halfe a pounde, and boyle it by decoation, and in the end put in the fpices, and make a leguarie of the which give buto the fick two brams at a time.

To preserve from the pestilence.

Take two Egges a make a hole boon the top of ech of them, then take out the whites, and put into them so much whole D.tiy. Saffron,

Sincope Significth Saffron, as they may be filled but the middle, and let them be concred with other halfe shelles of Egges put byon them, then let them boyle byon the fire butil they become red, then braye them with all the shelles, and put therebute of white Diptamus, of Tormentil, of eche three drammes, of bomiting nuts one dramme and a halfe, of the seedes of Kocket the quantitie of the beaten Egges. Braye them all once againe, and put therebute of god Triacle the weight of all the receit except the Egges, and make a Leanarie. Of the which, give two drams in the morning when the pacient riseth, before he go to labor.

A Ceare cloth for fore and swollen legges.

Take of Camphire one ounce, of Minium, of Litarge, of eche two pounds, of burnt Lead one pounds, of Turia lire ounces, of oyle Dlive, of oyle of Kofes, of eche five pounds, of Aqua vitæ fire ounces, of ware as much more. Set the oyles but the fire, and being warme, put but them the Litarge, the Minium and the Lead, and worke it with a spatter, butil it be come but of the heigth of ware, in the ende put in the Aqua vitæ and the ware, and boyle them, putting in last of all the Camphire, and having made a Tere cloth, ble to keepe it by pon the sore, and you shall see a marvelous effect.

To remedie the commotion of the brayne through falling from fome high place, or through other oce casions and cuttes, when through the blowes men lose their speach.

Take of red Koles, of the leanes and fruite of Hirtelles, of Pomegranate flowers, of Calamus Aromaticus, of Gallia Muschata, of Lignum Aloes, of ethe one diamme, of Weale of Barlie, this ounces, boyle them in red wine, and Kole water, as much as sufficeth, and in the ende put thereby to one graine of Huske, and make a plaister to laye bypon the head, cutting first away the heares with a charpe rator.

To

To remedie the falling ficknesse in children.

Take of græne dimiraldes, of red Cotall, and of the liedes of Pionie, of othe thie diamines, of Storax calamite, of Molemarye flowers, of Bittonie, of Cobwebbes, of othe one diamine, of Juic berries halfe a diamine, braye them, and my copposate them with the gum of an Oke, and make a platifier, and put it begon the cloalure of children, and cause it to be kept thereon butill it fall away of it selse.

To heale the cuill habite, and to cure them that have the splene.

Take of the filing of Stile preparate in binegar fire drams, of Citrack, and of Sum Ammoniack, of eche halfe an ounce, of firop of Bilantius as much as sufficeth, make a leau arie, of the which, take halfe a spenefull at a time fasting.

A preservative against the pestilence.

Take of Saffron, of Setwell, of Tomentil, of Diptamus, of eche one ounce, of Triacle, of Bitridate, of Sugar, of Bugloffe, of eche eight drammes, with the frop of the pilles of Dome Citrons, make a lectuarie. Of the which, give to pres ferue the partie according to his age. Bicause if he be about the age of rb. yeares, give him two drammes in the morning before meate with white wine, and after it, grue him to male tice Coriander fedes. If he be of the age of ring, peares, give him a dranme and a halfe. And being buder the age of . rilli. peares, give him a dramme, and when he goeth out of the house, let him holde in his mouth a little of the sayde leavarie. In curing the plague, the forelaid conferior must be given, as fone as he fæleth himfelfe to have the Ague, within the space of critis howes with the water of Sumack the quantitie afores faite according bute age . It helpeth also all colde infirmities, or griefes, ministred with wine, or with Aqua vita, having first made the buinerfall remedies, as purging, letting of bloud and fuch like.

# The fourth and last part

To remedie the discending of a Catarre through coldnesse of itomack.

Take of red Role leaves one bram, of Spikenarde, of Spica Celtica, of ethe halfe a dramme, of chofen Cinamonde, of Maces, of Autmegs, of eche one dram, of Pallicke, of berpe perfite Turpentine, of eche two feruples, of clarified Bonp as much as fufficeth. 132ap them, and mire every thing, and make therof a lectuarie.

To remedie the Kings euill.

Take Vitriol and put it byon the coales, and let it boyle and call fourie fo long, that it become red. Then brave it, and put it to biffolue in Aqua vita, and being taken out, let it drie. And thus doe their times. In the ende put it into a fine piece of linnen cloth, and let it hang in a movil place with a potinger or forme other Recipient brock it, for it will cast oile like buto opls of Tartar. Take as much of the lapde ople, as of Aqua vitz, and bathing therein a sponge, binde it bypon the soze, and in thost space it will breake it.

To heale many infirmities with oyle of Sulphur.

Take and give two drops of opic of Sulphur to drinke in the decoction of Pionte & Bettony the quantity of thee ounces, it will heale the falling licknesse. If there be given of the layd ople to brinke in a little quantitie of Taomwoo water, it will cause the appetite to come again. They halbe healed of Agues which in the beginning of their fits drinke of this oyle with the decocion of Kolemarie, and of Mornie wood. A ake and boyle of the leaves of Germaunder beaped in wine, and of Pimper. nell, and mire ther with the rotes of Comphrey the greater, of So. Johns wort, of Birtels, of Centaurte, of Calamus aromaticus brayed, and washe therein little bagges, and put them into the woundes, and you thall fee a maruellous effect. Take and boile in water a quantitic of Agrimonie, and of Kie, and of the decocion give two ounces to drinke at once with a

brop of the fand onle: to kill the wormes in children . Take and bople Garlicke in wine, of the which cause the pacient to brink tivo ounces with a little of the favo ople to proude brine. Take and boyle a Kadith in wine, and put thereto a little of the layd ople, of Triacle, and of Ditridate, and give it to be dunke, and wathe the bolozus place, and it will heale the plague. Foile of Rolemarie, of Telendine, of the rotes of Calamus Aromaticus, of Bafill, of Saffron, of eche a fmall quantitie, in wine, with the which wall the hands, the fate and the heade thrice a day, it will beate Welancholie, and adding therebuto a little of the late onle, give it to be drunke. Likewise the ople being brunke with the decocion of Agrimonie, healeth the Otic fick, and given with the water of I reos, t with Bonp, it helpeth the Dropley. It conferueth the radical humiditie being minis fred with Palmeley, And being given to drinke with water of Margerome, it healeth all the defens of the head, or with was ter of Balme, and of Bugiosse. And also it healeth the griefes of the head, the disease Vertigine and Scotomia, if the body be Vertigine, purged, and then the fayd oyle be given to be brunke with was Scotomia, ter of white Lillies, it helpeth the Litargia, It prohibiteth dreas difeafer of ming in fixpe, being given to winke with water of Courses the bead and Poppy. It healeth the Apoplexia given with Aquavita, when with the bodge being first purged . Being ministred with fennell simnesse of water, and of Siler Montanus, it healeth the weakeneffe of fight all the fight. Being given with water of Quinces, it prohibiteth things bomit : and with water of Burfa paftoris, it frapeth the bomis Seeme to go ting of bloude. Being given with water of Billifolie, and of rounde. Taxus barbatus, it belveth the Demerodes, and other defens Litareia,10 of those places. Given to brinke with water of Tamarifci, it a fore difbelieth the milt. And being given to brinke with water of Bas cafe of the biffer and Sca brembles, it expelleth granell, In touching pur brainer. trified fores ther with, it healeth them. And like wife announting that part of the head which aketh, ther with, and giving thereof to brinke after and before meate with Malmelie, or some other Capitall water, it causeth the paine to cease.

# The fourth and last part

To heale scalie or rough hands happened through the French disease.

Take of Vitriol Romanum two drammes, of quicke filter one dramme, mortifie the quicke filter with spettle, and being wel firred in the morter, annoint the palmes of the hands, and being annointed with the said outment, annoyit them after with Vnguentum Rosatum of Mesue, and the disease will be healed.

#### Another for the same.

Take of Cloues two ounces, of Cinamonde as much more, of leaves of Pettles one handfull, put them into a belief full of water to boile, butill the fourth part be confumed, and being taken from the fire make a fomentation, covering the fores with a linnen cloth, and recepuing the fume but o your palmes as hote as you can abide it, by the space of halfe an houre, that is in the morning when you rise, and at evening when you go to bed, and in doing so the space of .rb. or.rr. dayes you shall be hole.

#### Against Melancholie.

Take of Lignum Aloes, of Clones, of Tardamomes, of Spis ca Celtica, of ethe two drammes, of Borage flowers, of Bugloffe, of Roses, of ethe two drammes, of rosted nuts two drams, of leaves of Sene, of swete Almonds, of Justices, of eth one ounce, of Lapis Armenia preperated three drams, of Annis saides, of Fennell sedes, of ethe two ounces, of Sastron two scruples, of the bone of an Parts hart, of Doronoce, of Setwell, of Jacines, of Smiralds, of Saphires, of Basill sedes, of ethe one scruple, of Margarites preperated two drammes: make a lectuarie with Ponye of Aliolets boyled, as much as sufficeth, and decount with the suice of Germaunder, of Juse, and of Buglosse, of ethe one ounce and a halfe, butil the suice be consumed. De which consection take a dramme and a halfe

Doronici, is aroote brought out of Mauritania good for the flomack.

in a little white sweete wine aromatized, morning and cuening two houres before meate.

To mitigate the paines of the French disease in any member.

Take of ople of Camomill, of ople of Dill, and Roles of eche one ounce, of Greppola, of Ceruce, of Litarge, of eche one ounce, of quicke filuer extinct with spetche halfe an ounce, of ware as much as sufficeth, meddle all togither, and make an ointment, with the which being colde, annoint the payned member, and you shall have a happie remedie.

To remedie the milt that is hardened.

Take of Gum Ammoniack, of Allarum, of the liedes of Agnus caitus, of Rew, of Titrack, of Calamus Aromaticus, of Hope, of the flowers of Tamarifcus, of eche one ounce, of the rinds of Capparus rotes, of Bettle ledes, of And nis faides, of Smalledge, of Cinamond, of eche two drammes, of god Dony as much as lufficeth. Wake a lectuarte, of which let the diseased take halfe a sponefull in the mounting two houres before meate, and you that have your intent. Also while he taketh the lectuarie, let the milt be announted, with this binder written opniment twice a daye fasting. Take of oyle of Capers, of ople of Rew, of Camomill, and of Iwate wine, of ech one yound, of the rotes of marth Mallowes, of Mallowes, Felce is the and of Felce, of eche halfe an ounce. Biay well the rotes, and filthic orle bople enery thing, butill the wine be confumed, and put there: that is in buto of the rotes of Kew well brayed, and of firing binegar, the flankes of eche one pounde : boyle them once more, butill the binegar or neckes be consumed. And being strained, put therebuto of Oppoponack, of Galbanum, of Bdellium, and of Ammoniack, of eche two ounces. Distolue the Gummes in strong binegar, boyles a little, and with ware make an opniment.

To preserve from the goute.

Take of Mirrha, and of Aloes Epatici, of Lignum Aloes,
of Cinamond, of Passick, of Reubarbe, of ech two scruples,
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of Busine one graine, of Oximel simplex as much as sufficeth, make a passe of pilles, of the in hich, take every other mozning one pill the quantitie of a scruple, and you shall see a maruellous effect.

To heale the face of scurfe or scabbes.

Take of Camphire two drammes, of washed Ceruce, one ounce, of red Cicers halfe a pound, of the pulpe of Pelons one pound, of the egges of Swallowes tenne, of Pargarites two drammes, of the fedes of Bombace three drammes, of common Salt two drammes, of the fuice of Limons source ounces, of the lyes of white wine halfe an ounce, powder those things that are to be poudred, and put them all to be discluded in ten pounde of water of Lapacium acutum the space of two dayes, then put them into a Limbeck, and draw out the water, with the which wash the face three or source times a day, and it will make it cleane.

Against the chappes int he hands through heate of the liver.

Take of oyle Dline, of pelow ware, of the fat of a Ducke, or of an Hen, of the fath that is in woll before it be walked, of the Ducklage of Duince feedes, of Sterche, of Dun Dragant, of eche as much as you please, make an opniment, wher with annoynt the palmes.

To heale one that is stiptick of body.

Take of white wine three pounds, of the leanes of Sene eight ounces, put them to disolve in the saide where the space of twentie and source hours, then straine it, and in the strayning put but it of Corranes two pound, of sine Sugar one pound, boyle it butill the wine be consumed, and reserve the Coranes, of the which give the discased one ownce or a little more to cate before meate, according as he shall be bound, and you shall se a maruclous effect without any griese.

To heale one that cannot piffe through fleugme.

Take of the heades of thelles of Egges, out of the which Chickens be issued, and bray them finely, giving a dramme therof to drinke in god white wine, and presently be will make water.

To purge the head by the nose, after the vniuerfall purging of the whole body.

Take of Pargerome, of Sage, of eche one diamme, of white Pepper, of Nigella, of Cubebes, of eche two teruples, of Cloues, of Putmegs, of Pellitorie, of eche halfe a diamme, of Turpentine, of ware as much as sufficeth. Pake as it were a little bagge of tente with a thred fastened but it, that you mape at your pleasure put it and take it from your note.

To stop the flix of a Catarre.

Take of Cloues, of Cinamonde, of Mastick, of Maces, of Afterha, of eche one beamme and a halfe, of the fruite of Cipies, of red Cotall, of Pomegranate sowers, of eche sire graines, by ay them, and with Rosen make a Cerote, and shaving away the heares of the closure of the head with a Kasoz, lay it theron certain dayes, and it will cause a maruellous ease, so that the intemperance of the heade procede not of heate. Bis cause in such a case the hote spices be taken awaye, and there on be layde onely Cloues, Rose leaves, Mystell berries, and such like.

Against the debilitie of nature and all other infirmities.

Take of leaves of Golde a hundred, of Margarites, of Marces, of Agarick, of the flowers of Bugloffe, of Borage, of buttonight files, of Calamus Aromaticus, of Sage, of Lignum Aloes, of Polipodie, of all the Saunders, of the rotes and fiedes of Pionie, of eche halfe an ounce, of the inice of Lignuity.

querice one ounce, of chosen theubarbe, of the pulpe of Wome Citrons, of eche halfe an ounce, of Billaches, or munitified Wine kernels, of freete Almonds, of Kepions, of Jennicts, of eche fine ounces, of the fleine of a Capon fire ounces, of the dethe of Wartriges one round, of Triacle, of ople of Turpens tine, of eche two ounces, of red Rofes fiftene branmes, of the fuice of Koles, of the coddes of Roles, of eche fire drammes, of the leanes of Sone tenne diaments, of white Tartar epolit brammes, of the flowers of Steeados, of Bittonie, of Cina mond, of Doronici, of Folium, and of the rindes of Pome Citrons, of all kindes of Myrobolanes, of red Corall, of the fragments of Jacinas, of eche thie drammes, of Ciperus, of Cardamomesthe greater; of Capis lafuli, and of the ffone Armenia preperated, of white Incenie, of Pargerome, of Spinter, of eche tivo diamines, of Walme, of red and whyte Ben, of Setwall, of eche one dramme and a halfe, of Spike nard, of Saffron, of Amber, of Cloues, of Putnicgs, of Calingale, of eche one dramme, of Dulke halfe a dramme, of Sugar bii. pounde and a halfe, of perfite Aqua vite.rv. pound . And kape the water which Halbe distilled in a great Still of Classe ivell closed, as a precious thing and of great value, bicause three or foure drops therof being brunke with wine, healeth all cold infirmities as well within the body as without. If the infirmities proceede of a hote cause, being ginen with Endine water, to drinke, it healeth all griefes. And giving fire drops thereof with

with flucte wire, it refforeth the defea or want of nature. It beloeth marueloully the plague, for drinking therofenery more ning when you go out of the house fine or fire droppes with a little strong wine, and washing your handes, note, and face therwith, it preferreth from the pelfilence, and being infected with the euill, pet by touching the Boches, or Tarbuncles ther, with, it is of verie great effea . It helpeth like wife the Palley, and the falling ficknette, if with the faid water the nape of the necke be washed.

To remedie the falling away of the heare from the head or bearde.

TAke of Switte lye, that is, of that which is not frong, as much as you thinke fufficient to wall your heade, and put therein of Aristologia rotunda, of the rotes of Kew, of eche halfe an ounce, of Gentiane, of Reupontici, of ethe three oranmus, of Centaurie two drammes, boyle them butill the thirde part be confumed, and ther with walh the heade. And af ter annount it with this ople. Take of the rotes of Ireos, of Squilla one ounce, of Centaurie the leffer, halfe an ounce, of Mirtels one ounce, of Cloues one ounce and a halfe, of ople of bitter Almonds one ounce. Put all these things into a bessell of Classe, and being well closed, bople it in Balneo Maria, the space of fire houres with a soft fire, and let the ople in the funne, with the which, annount the dilease after you have walhed it with the loe aforefai, and at night when you go to bed.

Take of Autmegs, of Clones, of eche halfe a dramme, of a difeafe Setwall two scruples, of Tentian one scruple, of red Ro, of the bead, fes, of pellowe Baunders, of eche one dramme and a halfe, of wherein is Aloes Cicotrini fice drammes, of chosen Reubarbe three seemeth to drammes, brave cuery thing fenerately into pouder by it felfe, and wijen they are medled, wet it by fprinkling thereon a little Rose water, and then let it drie, and thus doe seuen times: then things two-10.f.

with firop of Miolets make a paste of Billos, of the which, take a scruple in the evening one houre before meate, and you shall six a verie great ease.

To cause heare to grow againe, and to keepe them from falling away.

Take of chosen Mirrhe, of Aloes, of Labdanum, of eche two ounces, of Folium, of Mirtell berries, of Capillus Veneris, of the flownes of Ligustrum, of eche two handfulles, braye them well and mire them: and take of ople of bitter Almonds, of ople of Sisamine, and of Alchanna, of ech two ounces, mire enery thing togither, and being put into an earthen bestell glased, with a straite mouth, and closed well with Lutum sapientie, burte it in hopse dung. roldages: then distill it and kiepe the water, and the ople that shall be drawne, to and noght the rotes of the heare, and it will make a verie sproye and happie effect.

To take away the spots and scurfe happened through the French disease.

Take of white and blacke Elleborus, of ethe one handfull, Elleborus of the leanes of Laparium acutum two pounde, of wilde aibus, is an Cucumbers three ounces, of the pulpe of Melons with the birbe calfiedes three pound, of the pulpe of Limons, and of the fuice of led Lingthem foure pound. But them into a Limbeck of glasse, and let wort, the it stande to settle three dayes, and being distilled, washe with roste wherethe water the source or spots, and it will heale them.

Take of Sal niter the ounces, of ople of bitter Almondes two pounds, of Squilla halfe a pounds, of the meate of Lismons one pound, diffill them as is aforefaide of the other, and worke the ople with god fuce: se.

Against the dilatation of the fight of the eye.

Take of Telendine water, of Fennell, of Epebright and of Roses, of ethe source ounces, of Sarcacolla, of Kew, of eth one dramme, of Gum Serapine halfe a scruple, of the gall of an Dre one dramme and a halfe, boyle them all togither, and being distilled, put therof twice a day into the eye.

To preserve the teeth from putrifaction.

Take of the theles of burnt Dyffers made in powder their drammes, of Sandarack foure drammes, of the rotes of Ireos two drammes, of the rotes of Arifologia, of Centian, of Centaurie the greater, of ethe two drammes. Braye every thing seperately, then mire them togither, and with Oximel squilliticum as much as shalbe sufficient, make little passils with the which you may rub the texth, and wash them with was ter of Squilles, discoung the little cakes in wine, and you shall so a maruelous effect.

To fasten the teeth which are redie to fall through the French disease,

Take Plantine water and mire it with ople of Brimstone, and touch ther with the gummes, and after they be mundified, take of Plantine leaves, of the tender leaves of wylde Plive træs, of Sage leaves, of eche halfe a handefull, boyle them in olde white wine, and wash therewith the gummes of the sicke many times.

Take of the greate of an Hog two ownces, of Incense, of Aloes, of ech one dram, of quick silver two drammes, mortifie the quick silver, and bray it in a morter, making therof an oputment, and worke it. And so, a finall remedie so, those that are berte malignant, ble the oputment Egiptiacum with Soublimate medico ther with.

To heale knobbes in the naturall places of women.

Take of the ponder of Scabiole, of Tommentill, of eche one dramme, of Justic in ponder and burned, of red Corall, of eche two scruples, of Bole Armenick one dramme, of Justicense one scruple, of Mel Rosarum, of strop of Hirtels, and of wine of Pomegranates, of sche halfe an ounce, meddle them in a Horter, and with Bombace dipped in the sayd continent, touche the viseased place: or else take of Turpentine washed with Scabiose water, of Mel Rosarum, of eche one dramme, of Bole Armenick, of Justice burned, and of Parts home burned, of Aloes, of eche halfe a dramme, of the meale of Cockell two scruples, meddle them, and dip therein a suppositorie, and D.ig. put

put it into the naturall place, and if they be difficult to heale, with the foresaid medicines, then mire with the pouders Vnguencum Itie or Diapampholigos, or Diapalma, and put a into the naturall place.

To heale the scurse or scalles in the head, beard, or browes.

The of Ammoniack preperated in binegar one ounce, of Affa fetida one branche, of burnt Lime, or made red, two feruples, make a pathe, and put it energy day byon the fore, and if it enduceth is the, bis pacience and feratch not. A key ble also to heale them with other of Sulphur or of Vieriolic; else take of Arkenick and twoke it byon a Barble, and then poure it into a Basen with binegar butill the binegar remayne bypermost, then set it in the sunne to become drie, and thus doe three times. And as many times more insule it in pure water and let it drie. The which bie, first wast, ing with spettle a little Kombace, and putting thereto a beric little quantitie of the saide pouder, touch once the scurse of scales. In like maner preparate Oripigment, but take heede that you laye a beric little of the pouder byon the sore, that it maye not fret or consume very much.

Take the griene rotes of Celendine the greater, and have them with Brimitone, and annount therwith the place, and if the cicateices of fearnes be red, take of Ceruse, of Litarge of Silver walhed, and dissolve it with the inice of wide Grapes, of with the inice of Limons, and at night annount the place.

### To cause heare to grow.

Take of Palmeley, of childrens beine, and of Towes milke, of ceipe one pound, of Your halfe a pound, mire them in a Limbech, and draw out the water, with the which, washing the head, it cause the heare to grow.

Take of the fedes of Pionep, of the fades of Agnus, and of Calamus aromaticus, of ethe one dramme, of Siler Montanus, of die Rew, of Commin, of eth two femples, of Daucus, of Ameos, of Annis fedes, of Fennell, of Carowayes, of Ciperus, of ethe halfe a dramme, of Calamint, of the fedes of Rocket, of ethe one femple. Bray them into powder, and with the firop of Calamint, make of energy dramme feauen pilles, of the which, the woman must take there at one time, in the morning one houre before the eate, the must vie to doe it every other day.

To purge melancholie humors, and to remedie the pine of the head and stomack.

Take of Polipodie two pounde, of the leaves of Sene. rrb.
ounces, of Camarindes one pounde, of Reylons without
kirnelles fine ounces, of Damaske Prunes. rrb. of Borage
Cowers, and of Miolets, of eche two handfulles, of Payden
P.iii. hearc

heare foure handfulles, of Pelon ledes foure cunces, of chofen Tinamonde one cunce and a halfe, of Ginger, of Balt
Temma, of eche feuen diammes, of the inice of Lupines foure
pounde, of the inice of Endine two pound, of raine water thirtie pounde. Bire encrye thing togither, and boyle them accorbing but Art, butill the fourth part be confumed: then Arain
it, and make into the layd decoation twelve infusions of freshe
Roles gathered in the morning, and for every infusion put in
feaven pounde of Roles, and in the ende put therebuto of fine
Sugar eight pounde, and make a sirop. The vie of which is to

Take of Putmegs, of Cardamomes, of Palficke, of Cubebes, of Graines called in Latine Grana Paradyli, of Cinamond, of Auts of India, of eche one ounce, of the three fortes of Saunders, of red Koles, of Fumiterrie, and of the flowers of Borage, of echetivo ounces, of the fades of Bu giotte, of Endine, of ech one handfull, of all the kindes of Pyzos bolanes, of ech one dram, of the feedes of Coloquintita, of Bdcls lium, of Agarick, of chosen Turbit, of eche two drammes, of chosen Reubarbe halfe an ounce, of Panna one ounce and a halfe, of Camphire two diamnies, of Bulke and of Amber, of eche one dranme. Wzape those thinges that are to be brayed, groffely, and put them to diffoluc in. bill round of Aqua vitæ the space of crity, houres, and then distill it with a soft fire by a Limbeck, putting therebuto two pounde of Lugar, and in the ende put to it the Buske and Amber. Take of Turbit halfe an ounce, of Diagredium one dram and a halfe, of Diadragant one ounce, of white Einger two drammes, of Hermodacills two drammes, of Manna granata one dramme and a halfe, of Carthamus feedes halfe an ounce, of the inice of Duinces one ounce, of the inice of preper rated Koles one ounce, of the inice of preper rated Koles one ounce, of the inice of Sage three ounces, of Jup water two ounces, of fine Sugar eight ounces, make a confection in morfels, of the which, give the pacient to purge with halfe an ounce, in the morning early, and you fight for a berie good effect.

To cause the seuers Perhiodica to cease after they be prolonged.

I pfine the leanes of Telomiwode in water the space of ten houres, then take out the said leanes, and cast them awaye, and set the said water to boyle, butill the halfe be consumed, of the which, giving source ounces but the sicke, he shall sweate in such sort that all the Feners will cease which happen through colde humors.

To heale those which have the eye liddes infected of sharpe or salt humors.

Take of raine water and fill an earthen pot therewith that conteineth in quantitie fire pound, the fet it boon the fire, and when it beginneth to boyle, cast into it of Sugar Candie, and of Aerderame, of eche one ounce, of common Salt in pouder as much more, and after they have voyled a little space, take as way the pot from the fire, and let it settle, and being strayned, reserve the cliere water to washe the eye lyddes, and put byon it this of itment, take of Butter that is fresh one ounce, of Tutia preperated one dramme, of Aloes halfe a dramme, of Ambergreece one scruple, make powder thereof, and the Butter being

being heated, meddle therewith the other thinges, and make theref an oyntment.

Against the falling sicknesse of children, and to heale the head of Catarres, happened through colde causes.

Take of Pirrhe, of Labdanum, of ech one dramme, of Storax Calamite, one scruple and a halfe, of Cloues two scruples, of Patrick and of Putmegs, of eche two drammes, make a plaisfer, with braying those things that are to be brayed, and miring them with the Gum of an Dke, lay it bron the closure of the pacients heade, the heares being first cut awaye with a rasor.

To heale those which pisse a bed.

Take the bladder of a Sote or of a there, burne it bypon a tyle on the fire, and give the pacient to drinke with water and binegar: or else boyle the testicles of an Hare in god wine, and give him to drinke of the same wine. It helpeth also to cause him to drinke before supper, a little pep or Pirrhe with wine, and to annoint him buder his yarde with the earth of a Smithes mill.

To heale the choking of the Matrix when it can not return e againe.

Take of greene Kew, and bray it well, and mire it with Honie, and dip woll therein made in forme of a tent, and put it into the fundiment, and presently it will be awaked, and returne agains into hir selfe.

To purge the hote goute.

Take of the Myrobolanes called Emblici, Chebuli, and Indi, of ech two drammes, of Reubarbe, of Acammoney, of eche halfe a dramme, of Aloes washed one dramme, of red Roles, of Pastick, of eche two scruples, Pake a paste of pilles with

with the inice of Koles. Df the which, give the pacient to take, in the morning made and proportioned in three pilles.

To remedie the difficultie of pissing through the impediment of fleume.

Take of the herbe Clinopodium one handful, of the worms called Porfe flies dried in an Duen, two drammes, boyle them in god white wine, butill the thirde part be confumed, and give four ounces thereof but o the pacient to drinke two hours before meate, and you shall see a bette god effect.

To heale fore and inflamed legges.

Take of Teruce, of Litarge, of ethe fine pounde, of white ware two pounde, of ople Dline twentic pounde: boyle it with a lost fire, and make a ceare cloth to lay opon the lose.

To remedie the griefe of the pleurifie when one is stopped that he cannot spit.

Take of Loch de pino, two ounces, of Diapenideon one dramme and a halfe, of the pouder of the rotes of Enula Campana, and of the rotes of Ireos, af eche two drammes, of the fuice of Liquerice two drammes and a halfe, with as much frop of Pozehound as sufficeth, and to make it more fronger to purge the brest, in freade of the Gum, put in Pettle sedes.

To purge the brest of the pleurisie and Ptisicke.

Take of Gum Ammoniack one dramme and a halfe, of Saffron halfe a dramme, make fiftene pilles with Oximel fquillicium, of the which, cause the diseased to take energe morning one.

To heale the disease of the pleurisie.

Take of Pettle leaves, of Pallowes, of Camomill, of Flar feedes, of ethe two handfulles, of Wirrhe two drammes, of Ammoniack one dramme and a halfe, boile them in two parts D.ij. of of water and one of binegar, and make a fomentation but the diseased part. And it will resolve the impostume, it will facilitate the spettle, and mitigate the paine.

A liniment to remedie the disease of the pleurifie.

Take of white Lillies, of sweete Almonds, of eche one ounce, of the greate of a Hen, of freshe Butter, of eche halfe an ounce, of Aucillage of Fenegreke, and of the suice of Ballow rotes, of ech three drammes, of Storax Calamite two drams, of the pouder of Ireos rotes, of Enula, of eche three drammes, of Saffron halfe a dramme, of ware as much as sufficeth, make a liniment, with the which let the sicke annoint the place of his griefe warme, morning and evening fasting.

#### Another for the same disease.

Take of ople of Linkede two ounces, of Ammoniack, of Operche, of eche one dram and a halfe, disolve the Cummes in binegar, and with ware make an ointment.

Another verie approued remedie for the same disease.

Take of the white dung of a Dog one ounce, of Comin two branmes, of the fat of a Cofe, or of a Den two ounces, of the inice of Coleworts as much as lufficeth, braye enery thing, and make a plaisfer, which being extended bypon a Colewort leafe, and being warmed, lay it byon the fore.

To remedie the paine and inflammation of the Milt.

Take of the bung of wood Dones one handfull, of Scolopens drin, of the rindes of the rotes of Capers, and of Pellilot, of ethe halfe an ounce, of Camomill, of Calamus aromaticus, of ethe one handfull and a halfe, of Cloues two drammes, of Euphorbium two fruples, boile them in an earthen pet with two parts of water and one of vinegar, butill the thirde part be confumed, and with Sponges of a felt tipped therein, for mentate the place with it warme.

To remedie or heale those that have the splene or quarterne agues.

Take of the athes of a whet stone, or of the wormes called Millepedi, in English Sowes or Gorse wormes, of both one dram, of strop de Bisanti, some ounce, of Oximel squilletique halfe an omice, with aperetice waters, cause the pacient to receive it early in the morning, and you shall see a mare uellous god successe.

To heale those that have the splene, and paine in the liver.

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become thicke. Df the which, give the pacient to take one of two sponefuls the space of seven mornings, and he will be hole.

Against coldnesse of stomack, and to cause a good colour.

Take of Dinger, of Depper, of Cinamond, of Peritoric, of Pionie, of Enula, of eche kuc ounces, of the filings of Fron preperated, the weight of all the rest, brave them all togither, and let the sicke take therof in all his meates.

To heale the diseases of the stomacke.

Ake the white of a new lapbe Egge, of Camphire halfe a scruple, of the milke of a woman which hath brought forth a daughter, of the mucillage of Pfillium, and of white Sief without Opium, of eche as much as sufficeth, cause to bee fquirted therofinto the pipe of the mans member. And then take of the flowers of water Lillics, of Wiolets, and of Hal lowes, of ethe one handfull, kople them in water butill the thirde part be confumed, and warme in the faibe becoaion the

Wether of a Lambe, and lay it byon the lowest part of the bellie, and about the nether parts of his parde, butill the ointment become colde, and working thus certains times, you thall his a maruelous helps.

To reuiue one that is fallen thorow the falling fick neffe.

Take of the inice of Rewe halfe an ounce, of Caftor one or dramme, mire them togither, and in the liquor bath little lockes of woll, and put them into the note, and you thall to a prefent effect.

A more excellent remedie against empoysments than is common Triacle.

Take of Juniper berries, of Cloues, of Putmegges, of the rotes of Enula, of cche tivo drammes, of the rotes of Aristologia longa, and rotunda, and of Bentian, of ethe fire branmes, of Purcelane leedes, of Sozell, of Doronici, of white Ben and red, of eche one dram, of the bone of an Warts hart, of Lignum Aloes, of white and red Cozall, of the thas uings of Judice, of Way berries, of Ballick, of eche two ferus ples, of Uciv one dramme, of drie figges, of Ucyfoils, of the pulpe of Dates, of ech one ounce, of Cinamond, of Liquerice, of eche balte an ounce, of Tomentill, of Cardus fanctus, of white Dittante, of eche thie drammes, of fluxte Almondes, of Dine kirnels, and of the common fedes, of cche one ounce, of Troffes of Agarick fire drams, of Dog Fennell two drams, of Terra figillata, and of Terra Militense, of Bole Armenick, of eche two ounces, of common Mummia, of Sctwall, of eche one dramme, of Camphire halfe a dram, of Dia trion Sandalon, and of Diarhodon Abbatis, of eche two brams, of the rindes of Ceder apples, of the fragments of Smiraldes, of eche one diamme, of Pulice one lecuple, of Pitridate two ounces.

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# The fourth and last part

To heale a thinne Catarre.

Take of Plantine water one pounde, of Rose water this ounces, of red and white Saunders, and of Cloues, of ech one dramme, of Camphire halfe a dramme, of vinegar of Rosses four counces. Pake pouder of those things that are to be brayed, and meddle them togither, then make hote a plate of Aron, and strewe bypon it some of the same pouder in a close Chamber, that the sicke person may receive the sume by his nose and mouth.

To cause a pellet of a Dagge or Pistolet which is in the slesh to come forth.

Take Bittonie and braye it well, and meddle it with the fat of an Hare, reducing it into the forme of an oyntment, and taule it to be kept byon the wound, and in thort space you thall see the pellet issue forth.

To remedie a swelling or paine that happeneth after a wound is healed.

Take of Oleum Nardinum, of oyle of Castor, of oyle of Eurpentine, of oyle of Costus, of oyle of Montion, of oyle of Montion, of oyle of Mew, of Vaguentum Aragon, of Althea, of Marcia, ton, of the grease of a Rauen, of eche two ounces, of Ireos in pouder, of Linkides, and of Aristologia longa and rotunda, of eche halse an ounce, of Mare as much as sufficeth, make a liniment thereof, and ble it with happie successe.

To purge a wound, and to draw out that which was fastened therein.

Take of Incense, of Pastick, of Spanishe Pich, of eche one ounce, of the fat of a Kam two ounces, of ople Dline as much more, of the inice of Plantine, of the inice of Taxus barbatus, of Cloers, and of Scabiose, of eche one ounce, mire all these with fine whites of Egges, and make an opnument.

To

To heale brusings of the head with broken bones or without.

Take of balt, of Hony, or olde white wine, of bulphur, and of Bittonie, of eche like quantitie, brage them and make a plaisfer therof, and lav it byon the fore, and if there be a bone broken, that the bloud be cutted in at some small fisure, then take of the meale of Rie, and of the meale of Dtes, of cche fine drammes, of the fuice of Plantine one dramme and a halfe, of Lapacium acutum one dramme, and make a plaisfer thereof with god Palmelep.

> To draw out things faitned in the flesh, as thornes and fuch like.

Take of the rotes of Polipodie, and being well braved with Barrowes greafe as much as fufficeth, make a plaisfer, and lay it boon the place: or elfe take of Farfara, and brave it Farfara, with Barrowes greate as is before faide, and lay it byon the an berbe loze, and prefently it will doe the effect.

called tußilage.

To heale the Kings euill and other harde impostumes.

Take of Pullarde liede, of Bettle liede, of Sulphur, of the fpume of fome of the Sea, of Arithologia, of Bdellium, of Ammoniack and of olde ople, of eche like quantitie, bear all things that are to be braved, and discolve the Tummes in vince gar and make a plaiffer.

To remedie the paine of the backe.

Take of the fuice of Billifolie, and put it into a biall of glaffe well closed and lutet, then put it into an Duen to boile, and after it is taken out, you shall finde in the Wiall oyle, with the which, annointing the back, or any other place that is gricued, pou thall fix a maruelous effect.

# The fourth and last part

To heale the rednesse of the nose.

Take of Bojar two diamines, of the incale of red Teche pealon as much more, of Lamphire one diamine, of the flower of Beanes as much more, draye them into fine powder, and with the fuice of Dinyons, or with clarified Hony make an ointment, and annount the place: or elfe, draye the stone of an Dre gall or Bulles, and with the ople of Pech stones make an ointment for the said paine. It helpeth also to insufe Beanes to become tender in vinegar, the space of egypt dayes, and being taken out and dried, make powder therof, then dissolue it with the white of an Egge, and annoint ther with the nose.

To heale one that spitteth bloud through the rupture of a veine.

A free the divertions of buinerfall purgings as the cure requireth, are made by the Phisition. Give the diseased to drinke one dram and a half of Lapis hematicis in pouder, in as much Plantine water as sufficeth, and you shall se the effect.

To heale the cuill colour of the face, and the Ptificke.

Diffil from the Moneth of June butill September, the rotes of Pollipodie of the Dke, and give the Keke to drinke at one time three or four ounces in the morning, and you that have your intent.

To heale fores in the naturall places of women.

Diffill in a Limbecke in June the rotes of Likes, and with the water that thall be distilled, walh the loses of ruptures, bathing therein pieces of linnen, of little bagges, and put them into the place.

To heale the knobbes which remaine in the ioynts after the paine of the goute.

Take a Stocke, and pull off the fethers, and the garbioge being taken out, fill it with all the losts of fatts that you may
baue

have, ercept the fat of a Swine, and put them into the bodge of the faid bird, then dreffe it, and lay it to roll, keeping buder it a besfell to receive the dripping which shall come therof, and if you take the faid fat or drippings, and put it into another of the faid Stockes, and lay it to rost againe, it will be the better, then put it into a besfell of glasse, or earth that is glased, and let it stands in the sunne the space of one day, then keepe it as a precious liquor to annoint the knobbes in the sountes.

#### To remedie the stinch of the mouth.

Take of Sage two ounces, of Rolemarie flowers halfe an ounce, of Cloues five drammes, of Cinamonde one dram and a halfe, of Putmegs one scruple, bray everye thing, and with Ponie make a lectuarie, and give thereof in the morning halfe a sponefull, and then drinke a little red wine, wherein is boyled a little Sage, and thus doe every daye butil you have your purpose.

### To heale the crestie growings of the fundiment:

Take of the herbe Peritorie and bray it, with the herbe Pilolifolie, putting thereto a little Salt, and being brought to the forme of a plaisfer, lay it uppon the place: or else bray an Onyon, and put thereto a little Capillus Veneris, and of the rotes of Aristologia rotunda, and being medled togither, lay it upon the fore in maner of a plaisfer.

#### To heale the Collick.

Take of the leaves of Dodder a handfull and a halfe, of the leaves of wilde Pallowes one handfull, of the Larde of an olde Pogge one pound, braye every thing well in a morter of Parble, and being somewhat warme, make a plaisfer bypon the bellie, where the paine is. And with this give him to drinke flue or fire ownces of oyle of swite Almondes, with which is mired source or sire drops of perfite Aqua vitx.

To heale the palfey of the tongue.

Then take a drain of their pulpe, and put thereo fire graines of perfite Euforbium, and having brayed it, meddle them togither, and let the ficke perfon holde the quantitie of a little Beane binder his tongue, and let him spit often.

To remedie the paine of the head proceeding through a hote or colde cause.

Take of the rotes of Brionic and bray them, and boile them in olde oyle, and a little wine, and with the layde oyle being warmed annoynt the place of the griefe: or else take of the oldest oyle you can get, imire there with three or foure graines of the powder of Euforbium, and annoynt the loze place, the bodie being first purged, and then purging the dead, by drawing op into the note the inice of Kew. Taking hede that if the paine doe happen through a hote cause, having first purged the bodie, or let it bloud by the beine, annoynt the griefe with this liminent following. Take of the inice of sower Grapes two ounces, of the dregges of ynck halfe an ounce, of Sastron fine grapnes, meddle them together, and make a liminent.

To remedie the griefes of the head and neck.

Take of the oile of swiete Almonds this ounces, of the meale of marthe Pallowes, halfe an ounce, of Ware as muche as sufficeth, make an opntment at the fyze, with the which being warme, annoynt the sicke morning and cuening.

To remedie the dimnesse of sight.

Take of the rotes of Radiches in the evening, taken at that present out of the earth, s being made cleane cut them in the middle with a knife, and put them into a verie cleane vilhe, and let the rotes lye with their cuttes downewerde, then let them stande a whole night in the agre, and of the water that shall distill

bisfill from them into the dithe, drop into the eyes, and you that have great ease, or else making water of Gum Cerapine, drawne by Alemnifrie, and disfilling thereof into the eyes, it will make a maruellous effect in taking awaye the dimnesse and other defectes of the eyes.

To heale the paine of the flanke.

Take of the lyner of an olde sea Archen and drie it, and being made in ponder, give the sicke to drinke thereof in warme broth the quantitie of a dram fasting, and you shall see a marticlous effect, and boyle with oyle Dine nettle leaves, and putting thereto a little Saffron, laye it byon the place of the griefe in maner of a playster.

To heale a burning canker called in Italian, Fuoco saluatico.

Take of whole Beanes one handful, of the Branne of Barly as much more, of the leanes of Pallowes two handfuls, boyle them in as much water as sufficeth, butil the halfe be consumed, and with the saybe decortion washe the sore twice a daye, that is, morning and evening, and then annoynt it with the soyntment. Take of Lytarge in powder one ownce, of oyle Dlive seven ownces, mire the Lytarge with the oyle in a Postynger, and put therto of whyte Wine, alway stirring it with a spatter, butil it come to the sorme of a liquide syntment, with which annoynt the sore.

To purge the matrix of women.

Take of the leaves of Tanley, and drie them, and bray them into pouder, of the which cause the woman to drinke halfe an ounce in god whyte wine, and it will purge the matrix commodiously: the lyke effect doth the inice of Paritoric given to drinke.

To stop the flixe of the bloud of the Hemerods.

Take of the flowers of Taxus barbatus, of the seedes of Bombace, and of Plantine seedes, and boyle them in sharp T.ij.

Thinc,

Wine, and wall often those partes, and you thall for the citea.

To heale the coldnesse of the matrix.

Take of Pulegium, in the time when it hath flowers, and having diffilled it by a Limbeck, give to drinke of the water that thall be drawne, two ownces for every time, in the morning fasting, and last at night, and you shall have your intent: it will also provoke the termes.

To drie vp the superfluous humiditie of the Vuola and of the gummes.

Take Pulegium, and boyle it with drie figges in vinegar, and with the said decoation gargarize, and wash often your mouth, and you shall see a happie successe.

To take spottes from the face.

Take of Allum Succarine their ounces, of fresh butter two ounces, of oyle of Tartar one ounce, meddle energy thing togither, and make it in some of an oyntment. With the which, the space of eyght dayes, at night when you go to bed, annoynt the cloutes or spots: and in the morning washe them with warme water wherein hath bene boiled Bran of wheate. It helpeth like wife to heap the rotes of white Lillies, and with Hony and white Ware to make an ointment, and ther with to annoint the place: or else take a Bottel of glasse, and fill it with kosemaric slowers, and close it with new Mare, and burye it halfe in sande, and cover the opper part with a cup, and let it stande so the space of one moneth, and you shall see the slowers turned into water, the which straine and keepe in a vessell well closed, as a precious thing to worke the effect asoresaid.

To heale a Ringworme.

A free you have purged the bodie of colericke humors, put into the wound of the inice of the tender leaves of a wilde Dlive tree, or the leaves themselves well brayed: or else take tivo

two or their nesses of Waipes, and a handfull of the combes of 15 kg, with all the young ones in them, and braye them well, and putting thereto a little Young, make a liniment to put into the love. And this of his owne nature both heale any such cuill.

### To heale the flixe of the bellie.

Take and winke the blonde of a Ducke, and it will doe the effect: of elle take the flowers of filberds, and drie them in an onen, then braye them into ponder, and give the ficke a dramme therof to drinke in god wine. And the livers of relied Pullets given but the ficke to eate, doe very much helpe.

## To heale the paine of the loynes.

Take of the liedes of Asparagus, and of Commin, of ethe one dramme, dray them, and with god wine give the ficke to drinke. The like effect worke the sedes of Persences given to drinke: or else two drammes of Enula Campana rotes given in wine. It helpeth likewise to make somentation but the place with liquide Piche, Sulphur viuum, and Salt boys led togither, and dip therein news shore woll unwashed, and as hote as you can suffer it, laye therof twice a daye bypon the sore is else lay onely bypon it quick Brimstone drayed, ming gled with grease and made warme.

## To heale those that pisse in their beddes.

Take of the hofes of a Bose of tame Hogge, and give the pasticient to drinke therof in red wine, of in broth. It helpeth als so to take the tongues of their Girle, and being rolled to eate them. As also to give to drinke being made in powder of Snays less founde out of their Helles in wine, and you hall finde that they will worke a marnelous experience.

## To heale the fores of the feete.

Take a quantitie of the Athes made of Pennes dunge, and being medled with Yong, make thereof an oyntment, and T.iij.

it will heale those sozes, or else take the harde shell of a Tortys burned, and laye the ashes dissolved with Whine and oyle by on the sayde sozes, and it healeth them. As also doth the lyke effect, to take the syntment made of Sheepes sewet dissolved with Ware, adding thereto a little roche Allum.

To kyll wormes in the eares.

Take of the leedes and greene leaves of Hempe, a taking out the inice, put thereof warme into the cares, and you shall lee the effect. Di else, take the Sawle of a Bull, of clarified Hony, of eche lyke quantitie, and boyling it in an earthen beficil, meddle it well togither, and referve it in a Hiall of Glasse, and when neede requireth, being a little warme, put thereof with woll into the care, first cleansing the eare from filthe.

To remedie the hurtes of the eares happened through entring of water into them.

Take a quantitie of Gum Jup, sof the fuice of black Beetes, and of the fuice of a Bremble, meddle them togither, and being made warme, put therof into the eares, and it will rease the payme, and dry by the water, it helpeth also the griefes of the cares, to take the gawle of a Swine, and being mired with the fuice of Lekes, and warmed, to put thereof into the eares.

To heale fores that are ingendred in the eares.

Take a Pomegranat, and having taken out the meat withs in, fill it with Hony, and let it boyle well in the embers with a fost fyze, and put of that being whot into the eares.

To dissolue impostumes vnder the eares.

Take of the meale of Lynfedes, as much as you think god, and boyle it in oyle, and Hony togither, putting thereto of Salt, and ashes made of a wylde Figge tree, and laye it byon the swelling in some of a pultace. The lyke effect is done, to take Gladian rotes beyng boyled, and brayed with salt, and layde byon the griefe.

To heale the stripes of the eyes.

Take of Byttonic leanes berie well braved, and kinde them bpon the place of the Grype, and you thail for a verie good effect. It helpeth also to meddle with meale of beanes womans Bilke, and to make it in forme of a player, and to lay it upon the fore eve.

To remedie the losse of appetite vnto meate.

Take of the faces of Speare Trifolie, t boile them in wine, and by the space of thee daves continually cause the diseas led to drinke halfe a Cup of the decoction, then let him drinke one dram of Opnger infused in Timeger three other dapes, at the same houre, and let him be well concred in his bed when he beginneth to flocat, and you thall fix a maruellous fucceste.

A maruellous remedy against fores and woundes.

Take of the ople of Momordica two ounces, of the ople of faint Iohns worte one ounce, of the marrow of a Bufalo Bufalosis halfe an ounce, put all these togither into a still of glasse well a beast like closed, and beying luted set it to the fyze, and after it is reduced to a borfe. to a forme within & ffill, work it with maruellous god fuccesse.

To preferue one from poyfoning.

Y Du must take heede that you cate not things of strong fas uoz, oz of a berie fivete taffe, bicaufe that the bitterneffe & ffinch of poplous in this maner is wont to be conered, for the ouer finete, fower or falt thing mired with poplon doth hide the bitternelle of it. At what time therfore you hall have any fulped to have drunke poilon, drinke prefently after it of the feds of Turneps, or of the rotes in Mine, or of peppe, and you Mall be fafe.

Against the birings of venemous beasts.

Take of Dnyong and braye them, and meddle therewith of Salt, and Pony, as much as you please, a make it in some øf T.IIII.

of an oyntment, and lay it boon the loze, and it will take alway the paine, and remedie the poyloning.

Against the stinche of the nose.

Take of the confection which is put into Ariacle called Hedicroo, dissolue it in wine, and annoynt within the nose offentimes, and you shall obtaine your intent.

To heale the griefes of the fundiment.

Take of the tender leaves of Henbane, and of Purcelane, and of crummes of bread infused in wine, the yolke of an Egge rosted hard, of ethe like quantitie, of ople of Roses as much as sufficeth, braye them all: then fomentate the place with the decoation of Roses, and of Pellilot, and laye byon it the Cataplasme asoresaid.

Against the impotencie of the Genitale member.

Take of raw Cicers, of mundified Pine kirnels, of ech two ounces, of the ledes of Rocket, and of Pepper, of eche one ounce, of Yony as much as lufficeth. Pake a lectuarie, and cause the sicke partic to take two drammes therof at a time in god wine. It helpeth likewise to take of Pepper, of Pine kirnels, of Percely, of the Pisell of an Part, and of Turpentine, of eche like quantitie, being brayed, mire them with Yony, and vie it as you doe the other: or else drinke in the morning a potinger of Schesmike warme, as it is miked, and put therein two or three drammes of the powder of Cloues.

To heale an impostumed Collick.

Ause the partie to be let bloud in the beine Basilica, and if by chaunce there follow presently retention of brine, draw bloud out of the beine Saphena, and lay bypon the griefe this opniment. Take of ware fine ounces, of oile of Camomill two ounces, of oile of Roses as much more, of the meale of Beanes halfe an ounce, of the yolkes of Egges fine, with the Bucillage of Linkings, make an ointment.

Against

Against the biting of a mad dogge.

TAke of Winegar one pound and a halfe, of Wich one pound, of Oppoponack three ounces, bople the Wich in Ainegar, with the which diffoline the Oppoponack, and being land up pon the biting, it will not fuffer the wound to close, and this is a convenient medicine against knobbes of hard firsh. Where: fore buto women or children you must make such a medicine liquide with Oleum irinum, and ble it.

Against indurate impostumes, perished Condilomi and hardened breites.

Condiloni. are certaine

Take of Litarge of filuer, of Lime, of sche one pounde, of thinges Manna, of Incense thee ounces, of white ware as much that fasten moze, of Galbanum one ounce and a halfe, of Allum and of the /kinne, Turpentine, of eche one ounce and a halfe, of I reos and of Co: which coperus, of eche like drammes, of Gawles, and of Wirrhe, of wereth the eche eyght drammes, of Dony eyghtene ounces, of ople foure childe in pounde and a halfe, put the Litarge and the Lime buto the the mothers byle, and boyle them, laboring them with the spatter, and when belie. it halbe thicke, put thereto the white ware, the Turpentine, and the Galbanum first sedden in hony : and being mired, and taken from the fire, adde thereto the other things in pouder: or elfe take of Bitume, of Litarge, of eche foure pounde and a halfe, of ovle Dlive fenen yound and a halfe, boyle them togither, and put thereto of ware fine ounces, of Galbanum, and of Wirrha, of cche as much more. Wake therof a plaiffer.

Bitume, a kinde of naturall Limeor Claye.

To diffolue an impostume vnder the care.

Take of fwines greafe fire ounces, of Ware two ounces, of the whytes of rawe Egges two, of Hony as much as of the Egges, of figge bult as much as fufficeth: Diffolue the Ware with the greafe, then put thereto the whytes of the Egges by little and little, then meddle therewith the yony and meale and ble it.

Take of Pine kernels two drammes walhed with warme water, of sweete Almondes, of Reylons, of Pissaches, of ethe one dramme, of Gynger, of Saffron, of whyte and red Wen, of Setwall, of the ryndes of Pomecitrones, of Walme, of ethe one dram, of Pargarites, of red Corrall, of Clones, of Maces, of Cardamones, of ethe halfe a dramme, of yelowe Saunders, of Cum Dragant, of Cum Arabick, of ethe two scruples, of Sugar sixtene drammes, dissolue the Suger with Walme water, and make a confection in morfels, of the which the sicke must take every evening the quantitie of a Chestnut, two houres before supper.

A confection to heale mistes or dimnesse of the sight.

Take of the inice of Fennell halfe a pounde, of the inice of Rew, of the inice of Belevoine, and of Pargerom, of eche halfe an ounce, numbifie them all, and take of clarified Hong one pound: boyle them togither but a init heigh, they to of Eyebzight one ounce and a halfe, of Fennell feder halfe an ounce, of Paces, of Tubebes, of Cinamond, of long Perper,

per, and of Cloues, of eche two drammes, make them into pouder, and meddle them and make a leauarie, of the which cause the Patient to take at night when he goeth to bed halfe a sponeful: notwithstanding let him leave to take it in the some mer when the weather is hote, or else temper it with hy greater part of Sugar Kolet. Then take of Fennell waters distylled through a Limbeck, of Pargerom, of Celendine, of Kew, of eche two owness: in the which waters distolue of Sastron one dramme, and of Antimonie two drammes, distill it thorows a felt, and of the water that shall be drawne, drop into the eyes twice a daye.

## Against the weakenesse of the fight.

A fter the purging of the bodye, take of the leaves of Bettonie, of Keive, of Eyebright, of Annys feedes, of Cinamonde, of Synger, of Cardamonies, of Fennell feedes, of
Percely, of Cilermontanus, of Origanum, of Pillope, of
Tubebes, of Liqueris, of eche one dramme, of Sugar buto
the quantitie of the other things, then make them all into pour
ber, and being mired together make a leavance, of the which
let the patient take halfe a sponefull, two hours after supper.

## An other for the same purpose.

Take of Epebright two ounces, of Fenegreic fine drams, of Pace, of Cubebes, of Cinamond, of long Pepper, of Clones of eche one dram, then fearce them, and make a lectuarie with a pound of clarified Pony, and of the inice of Fennel, and of boiled Telendine clarified, of ech half an ounce, boyle the inices with the Pony, butil they become thick, and in the ends adding thereto the pouders, make a confection.

# To keepe the belly follible in the infirmitie of the eyes.

A Confome to take opuers times, or often, that is to lave, every day falling, a dramme and a halfe of this confection:

take of Mirabolanes emblici, and Citrini, of ech two drams, of god Turbith one dram, of Opnger, two drammes and a balfe, of Cinamond one dram, of Putmegs two drammes, of Annys feedes, of Fennell feedes, of eche three drammes, of Sugar the weight of them all, make a pouber thereof, and with Sugar diffolued in Fennell, or Evelright water, make a lectuarie.

## Against the inflamation of the eyes.

## To heale the griefe of the eyes.

Take of the Buddes of Aines, and taking out the fuice meddle therewith the polke of a rawe Egge, and being well tempered wathe the Temples, and lape it boon the epe. This also helpeth. Take of Tutia of Alexandria halfe an ounce, of Malfick, of Incense, of Aloes Epatici, of eche one damme, of Camphire one scruple : of the suice of sower Grapes one pound, having made pouder of those things that are to be brays Codirion is ed meddle them togither, and make a Collision, and applie a medicine it buto the epe.

#### An other for the fame effect.

Take of Boale Armenick one ounce, of Tutia, of Sanguis the mouth. draconis, of Gum Arabick, of eche halfe an ounce, brap them, and fearce them, and meddle them with a yound of Kofe water, and put it into a Tipall of Glatte, and fulpend it in Balneo Maria, that it touch not the bottome of the belfell, not the fides about the bottome, and cause it to boyle by the space of balfe an houre, and being taken from the fyre, put thereto two brammes of the Wine of Pomegranates that is cleare, and letting it stande so a whole dave, put thereof afterwarde into the epes.

## To remedie the Litargie.

Take of the feedes of Agnus caltus, of Smallage feedes, and of Sage leaves, of ethe one handfull, of Salt water as much as fufficeth, boyle them and fomentate the hinder part of the bead with the occortion.

Take of Balme and of water Pintes, and beyle them in god wine, and being given to drinke, it remedieth the mas king of water by drops, and if of the faide herbes toyled, you make a plaiffer, and lave therof betweene the nauill, and the bottome U.n.

The inice of Barberies given to drinke, purgeth a womans watrir, and froppeth olde flires, but if the Barberies be given a woman to drinke, they will doe the like effect, and also beloe all the other flires of the bodge.

Against stinging of Bees.

Take a piece of linnen cloth, and wash it in distilled Borage water, and lay therof often byon the stinging, and it will take away the paine.

To heale the inflammation of a mans yarde.

Take of the leaves of Bruscie, brave them, and boyle them with Rose water, and a little wine, then take them out, and make a playster-laying it bypon the member, and you shall see the effect.

A remedie against coldnesse, and debilitie of the reines, the paine of the backe, and want of appetite vnto a woman.

Take of Persence rotes as many as you please, let them be faire and great, and cut away the tops, and take double as much of Sugar, and put them into an earthen pot of water, and boyle them with a slow fire untill they begin to ware tender, then lay them upon a Gyrdion that they maye cole, then pare them and take out their pithes, and after put them into a new earthen pot glased, and put thereto as much good clarified

Hony as will couer them, then book them butill the Hony doe thosowly penetrate every part of them. Then take them from the fire, and put into them of Cloues two parts, of Cinamond, and of Dinger one part, bear them and meddle them with the rotes, of the which the licke partie eating fasting one ounce at a time, thall finde a maruelous effect.

To remedie vomiting occasioned of colde humors.

Take of fwate Pome rials, and boile them wel in two parts of water, and one of Honp, and being taken out, boile them once againe in Bony only, and then put them into a beffell of glaffe, and poure oppon them as much clarified Hony, that they may be covered, and adde buto them thele Spices . Take of Cloues, of Cinamond, of Ginger, of Cardamomes, of Bepper, of eche a like, fuch quantitie as you thinke convenient for the quantitie of the apples, and ble to eate of them, and they will be berie effectuall.

> Against the streynings when a man cannot go to the stoole.

Take of Mandlen wortes, and boyle them in tart wine, and make fomentation from beneath. It helpeth also to stop the bloud of the Demerodes.

To remedie deafnesse or want of hearing.

Take of ground Jup, bear it, and take out the inice, and bes ing a little warmed, distill thereof at divers times into the eares.

> To heale bruses about the eyes without launcing or incision.

Take of Saftron halfe a dramme, of offe of Moles one ounce, one yolke of an Egge, bray the Saffron, and meddle them, and lay therof byon the eye.

To heale watrie or dropping eyes.

A fter the bodge is thosowly purged, take of the rindes of Ancente, of Turia well preparated with Pargironic was ter, of Eirrhe, of eche one dram, of red Corall as much more, with Fennell water as much as sufficeth, brage those things that are to be braged, and make a Cellicion, with the which wash the eyes.

An excellent pouder for the same disease.

Take of burnt Antimonie five drams, of Turia of Alexandria preperated three drammes, of Lignum Aloes burned halfe a dramme, of the stones of Dates burned into coles three drammes, dray all these things into verie sine peuder, and having tempered them with Kose water, drie them in the sunne: then take of Huske one graine, of Amber as much more, temper them with Kose water, and being dried, beate them with the socialide things, and draye them into a verie sine pouder, which you shall be after but the eyes.

To heale the griefes of the eyes.

Take of Incense well braped halfe an ounce, washe it in warme water, and let it stande so the space of two houres, then with Fennell water make a Collicion and ble it. It helpeth maruclously to take a dramme of the vitriature or glading of best-lamate in powder, and being medled with oyle of the sedes of Bombace, to put it into the eye.

To heale fores of the cares that offend the hearing.

Having purged the bodie thorowly, take of finall wine some what sweete, of childrens brine, of oche one ounce, boyle them with one ounce of Hony medled therwith, and put there of into the eares. After the sore is mundified, take of Incense, of Sarcacoll, of Hirrhe, and of Aloes, of eche one dramme, dissolve them in wine, and dip therein tentes, and put them in

to the eares: or else ble this remedie. Take of the droffe of tried Iron often walhed with vinegar, and made into pouder, of Wole Armenick, of the barke of Incense, of Sarcacoll, of Pirrhe, of Aloes, of eche one dramme, dissolue them in wome and vie them.

Against the griefe of the loynes and of the eyes.

Take of the ople made of Auts of India that is old, and with that annoint the licke person, and it will doe the effect.

Against difficultie of taking of breath through coldnesse.

Take drie Figges and boyle them in wine, and meddle ther, with of the pouder of puttes of India, and give to drinke thereof every daye, and it will worke marvelously. Also the water of Origanum being drunke by three ounces at a time, helpeth.

## To heale a drie cough.

Take a quantitie of Beetes, and boyle them, and put thereto of sweete Almondes, and of the inice of sweete Pomegranates, of eche lyke quantitie, and give thereof to eate, and you shall finde a marvellous helpe.

Against the hardnesse of the matrix.

Take of the herbe called Origanum, and boyle it in Wine, and meddle there with of oyle Pline, and bathe therein pieces of linnen cloth, and put of them often into the natural place of the woman.

Against the falling of the Vuola, and swelling of the Pallate.

Take of Origanum in the month of June, and beave it, and defill it through a Limbeck, and with the water let the patient Cargarize, and walhe hys mouth three or foure tymes a day.

To remedie the printes of blowes that remaine.

Take a quantitie of oxie leaves of Margerom, and making pouder thereof, meddle therewith Dony, and annoynt the swollen ox rankled place. The lyke effect is done with the suice of the same, if the place be annointed, for it will dissolve the dead bloud buter the skinne.

Against swellings of the face.

Take wylde apples, or crabbes in the ende of June, and distill them thorow a Limbeck, and with the water that thall be distilled washe often the face, and the intent will follow.

To keepe heare from growing white.

I the ende of Pay take of the herbe called Balme, and diftill it thosow a Limbeck, and of the water that thall be diftilled, drinke twice a daye two ounces at a time, and likewise wall the heare, and you thall six the effect.

To heale the itch of children.

Take and beare a handfull of grane Pyntes, and laye it in Lie one whole day to become tender, and with the fayde Lie washing the children, and you shall heale their itch.

Another for the same.

Take of ople of Roses one ounce, of Storax liquida, halfe an ounce, of common Salt one scruple, and a little of the suice of Limons, meddle them all well togither with a spatter, and annoint therewith.

Against trembling or shaking.

Take of the oyle of Gum Juy, of the oyle of Cherna, of eche one ounce, of oyle of Roses, of Bdellium, of Serapine, of Oppoponack, of Passicke, of eche halfe an ounce, of oyle of Fores and of Bayes, of ech one ounce and a half, of the fat of a Kam, and of a Gose, of eche two ounces, distolue the fat with Kose water and Ainegar as much as sufficeth, and mixing therwith the other things, make an ointment, with the which, annoint the oppermost part of the head, and the other weake members.

Against stinch of the mouth through rotten teeth.

Diffill thosow a Limbeck in the middelt of Paye the toppes of wilde Pintes, and with the water that thall be diffilled, walh often the mouth of the discased.

To heale the white flixes in women.

Take of the flowers of Rocket, and of Poule eare, and of Origanum, but a full quantitie, beate them into pouler, and adde thereto of Sugar halfe the quantitie of them all, and make thereof morfels, of the which, let the woman cate, and it will worke a maruellous effect.

To heale the relapfation of the gummes.

Take of Pirrhe as much as you please, and being disolved in wine and oyle Dive, wash therwith the gummes, and you shall see a most true experience, if you vie it oftentimes. It helpeth also to take the water of wilde Bintes distilled through a Limbeck, and often therwith to wash the gummes.

To heale chappes in the fingars,

Take of the rotes of Pollipodie, and bray them berie well, and meddle them with Hony, and annoint the fore, and you hall be the effect.

To

To heale a windie impostumation,

Take of griene Rew, of Fennell, of Comin, of Annis fiedes, of Ameos, of Caratvayes, of Smallage fiedes, of othe fine drammes, of olde oyle fine pounds, put them all into a Utall of Classe, and boyle them berie well in Balneo Maria, and with that oyle annoynt often the place.

To heale the euill disposition which commeth before the Dropsey, and the obstruction of the Mesaraicall veynes.

Take of the inice of Morminod halfe a pound, of Spilinard one dramme, of Cinamond two drammes, of Sugar halfe a pound, make pouder of those thinges that are to be poudred, and being well meddled togither, give two ounces therof onto the sicke person at a time with Mine or broth.

## Against the flix of vrine,

Take of Primes five, of Corianders, of Pirtels, of eche two drammes, of Roles, of water Lillie flowers, of eche foure drammes, bople them in water, and take of the fapo deconion, and of the inice of the buddes of Times, of eche foure ounces, of Sougar fire ounces, make a firop, of the which take two ounces: or else make this other which is of a maruellous effect. Take of the rotes of Vingula Cabalina, of Vinbelicus Veneris, of Virga pastoris, of Plantine, of Burla pastoris, of Liverwort, of Kew, of Scariola, of eche one handfull, of This: let flowers, and of Penuphar flowers, of Lettis fedes, and of Durcelane fiedes, of eche one ounce, of white Doppie feedes halfe an ounce, of Jeuwes, and Sebaffians tenne, of red Roles, of red Saunders, of ethe halfe an ounce, of hulled Barlye two cunces, of Sugar two pounds. Wake a firop according to Arte, of the which, give buto the diseased person everye moz ning the quantitie of one ounce before meate, at least by two haures.

To remedie the impotencie of the Genitall member.

Take of the feedes of whyte Dnyons, of Satirion, of Date flowers, of Olibanum, of the braynes of Sparrowes, of ethe two ounces, make pilles therof with hote water, but o the quantitie of a Tyche peafe, of the which give the patient to take flue or fire at a time, and no more, and you shall see a veriegod effect.

## To heale fores of the Bladder.

Take of mundified Hine kernels dayed one ounce, of mundified Histories halfe an ounce, of the pouder of Liqueris two drammes, of the liedes of whyte Poppie halfe an ounce, of the common liedes mundified as much more, of Lettis, and Endine liedes, of eche one ounce and a halfe, of Reyfons three ounces, of Cinamond two drammes, of Sugar the weight of them all, make losenges, or morselles, the weight of halfe an ounce a piece: of the which let the fick person take one at a time before meat, and let him drinke after it a little wine.

## To heale the diseases of the reynes.

Take of Fylberds, of Pine kernels mundified, of Sum Dragant, of Gum Arabick, of the inice of Liqueris, and of Pennyts, of eche ten drammes, of the feders of Percurie, of bitter Almondes, of the foure greater colde fedes, of eche fine drammes, of the fedes of Aninces, of Pallowes fedes, of Porcellane fedes, of the fedes of whyte Poppie, of red Rofes, and of the fedes of Plantine of ech three drams, of the fedes of wyld Fennell, of Smallage, of the Garden and of the Wountaine, of Annys fedes, of Penbane, of Rocket, of Baffron, of Apium, of eche two drammes, make a confection with fodden Wiyne, mixing therewith of Pulke, and of Baffron two Crowne weight, of the which let the difeafed take the quantitic of a Beane, with Plantine water.

To heale ruptures within the body.

From the Month of Julye buto September, the rotes of Enula are to be distilled, the leaves are to be distilled in the ende of Mape, the water of the rotes being diffilled, and given the licke to drinke morning and evening, two or three ounces at a time, will doe the effect, of the water of the leaves there is not accustomed to be given to drinke, except onely as much as may be contenned within an Egges thell.

## A medicine to heale the Quinfey.

Take of the inice of Strawberies, and of Plantine water, of eche eyght ounces, of Hony of Koles two ounces, of the fuice of Hulberies one ounce, of Dogges dunge that is white, of Pomegranat flowers, of ech one drant, meddle cuery thing togither, and cause the sicke to gargarize himselfe often therewith. Then give him to eate of old sugar koset sire drams, of conserve of Duinces made with spices one ounce, of red Corrall two drammes, of Charabe one dram, meddle every thing, and give the sick person sire drammes therof fasting, and so you shall obtaine your intent, persevering to be it ceretapne dayes.

An other glyster most precious for the same disease.

Take of whyte Incense, of Sanguis draconis, of Terra sigillata, of Boale Armenick, of eche one dram, of Sastron halse a dramme, make sine pouder of the foresayde things, and medling them with source ounces of the suice of Plantine, and a little of the water of parched Barlie, make thereof a glyster.

## Another for the same.

I Thelpeth the Disenteria, to drinke the inice of Sozell with wine, and the inice of Parth Pallowes also being drunke both the like esten. To drinke also in the morning fasting three ounces of Borage water, helpeth the said disease: also it helpeth with more esticacie to drinke the inice of Bursa pastoris.

To preserve one from the goute.

TAke of the rotes of Kolemarie, and having boyled them berie well in binegar, if with the layd decoation you washe your feete, it will preferve you from the Goutc.

Against the belkings of the stomack.

Take Kew leaves and distill them in the middest of Mape, and of the water let the pacient drinke morning and Ques ning two or thee ounces, and you shall see the successe: and also it will expell the ventolitie of the bodic.

To cause a woman to bring forth a dead creature.

Take Millow leaves in the middelf of Day, and having diftilled them thosowe a Limbeck, give the woman to brinke thereof the quantitie of foure ounces, and it will cause hir to be delivered of the dead creature.

To heale the Dropsey and opilation of the liver.

The of Cloer flowers that are verie ripe, and diffill them in Balneo Mariæ, and of the water that shall be distilled, cause the discased to drinke morning and evening three ounces at a time, and you shall see an excellent successe.

An emplaister to heale the rupture of the scull.

Take of Plantine ledes the ounces, of Lapacium acutum foure ounces, of the meale of blacke Beanes as much as you please, beare them into pouder, and boyle them with berie strong wine, and lay theref twice a day boon the wound.

Another for the same,

Take of Sum Elemithie diammes, of pure Kolen foure ounces, of ware fire ounces, of oyle of Koles two ounces and a halfe, of Armoniack two ounces, of Tirpentine thie ounces and fine diammes, of Kye meals as much as sufficeth, with wine and ware make a plaister.

Against the paine of the Collick.

Take of Origanum one scruple, and being made into pous der, give it to be drunke in god wine, and you thall see the effect. It helpeth also to give to drinke of the wine made of the decocion of Porehounde the quantitie of three ounces.

To heale the itching or scabbes of the fundiment.

Take a quantitie of a Bricke that is in the top of a fornace, that hath bene burned a long time, bray it into pouder, but first washe it with common water, and then with Plantine water, and after meddle it with oile of Pirtels and white war, a having made therof an opnument, ble it but the fundament.

To remedie the paines and burnings of the fundiment.

Take the polke of a rossed Egge that is hard, s being brayed, dissolve it with white wine, and oyle of Koles, of eche as much

much as thall fuffice, and lape it bypon the fore. It helpeth also to take there drammes of the ponder of Kole leanes, two polkes of roffed Egges brayed, and incorporate them with white wine, and being meddled therein Vnguentum Rosatum, therewith to annoint the place,

To heale the disease called Iliaca passio.

Take of Sumack, and of Compn, bear them togither, and meddle them with Drimell, and give the diseased to drinke a dramme thereof.

Another remedie for the same disease.

Take a quantitie of the fuice of the leaves or budds of bines, and cause the appassionated to brinke thereof.

To remedie the issuing out of the Fundiment.

Take a quantity of Lentill leaves, and expresse the fuice from them, and annount there with the fundiment, or else take græne gawles, and bople them in wine, and being fodden make them into pouder, and put thereof into the fundiment.

To heale one that can not keepe his vrine.

Take of the braynes of an Egle the quantitie of a peale, of the fat of a Gole as much more, of Gum Arabick buto the fame quantitie, being medled togither fivallow thereof, as you would doe a pill : or elle, take the Tefficles of an Hare, and boyle them in god frate Wine, and give thereof to drinke. To remedie the congelation of milke within the breafts. Take a rawe Egge, and being medled with Vnguentum rofatum, aumoput the breffes. It helpeth maruelleulip the bonding of the bodie, if being distolned with Dyle of Roles, the breaftes be often announted therewith.

Take the partes of the inice of sower Pomegranates, of the tuice of Pintes one part, boyle them in a bestell of earth glafed, working it alwayes with a spatter, butill it become thick, and being taken from the fpre, give the pacient a sponefull thereof to eate before meate.

For one that hath lost his voyce.

Take of the inice of Coalewortes medico with hony, and give it buto the fiche: oz elfe take of Linfedes burned and braped and finely fearced, of fat Repfons without the fromes, of mundified Dine Kernels parched, of cleane Puts, of eche lyke quantitie, brave them and meddle them with hony, of the which holde often buder the tongue.

To remedie the hardnesse of the splene.

Take of the fat of a Crane, and meddle it with binegar of Squilles, and after the fick perfon is come out of the Baine, annoint the region of the iplene, and it will helpe marueloully.

Against empoysonments.

Take of Rape leedes, of Calamint, and of Terra figillata, a little of eneric one, and having meddled them togither, give thereof to drinke, and the poplon or biting of any benomous beaff will not hurt him.

To heale the flixes Disentericall or Lientericall.

Take a fifth called a Cogin roffed, without falt, and give of it the fiche to cate many times, and you that fee belth folow. To P.III.

# The fourth and last part

To draw out thornes or arrowe heads out of the flesh.

Take a quantitie of a Cuttle, and being well brayed, layer therof byon the griefe in maner of a plaisfer, which thorow a fecret vertue that it hath, will draw them forth, as also Sea Crabbes doe, being brayed and layde byon the griefes.

For women that be barren.

Take the nature of a female Have made into pouder after it is dried, and give it the woman to drinke in god wine, and presently after let hir companie with hir husbande, for the will be apt to be concepued with childe.

## Against the Collick.

Take of the fat of a Peacock, of the inice of New, and of Hony of eche like quantitie. Debole them and with Wine give them the pacient to drinke: or else being disolved in ople, or broth, make a glister, and presently you shall see the remedy.

Against the infection of the Skinne.

Take the bones of a Peacocke and burne them, and being brayed, dissolve them with vinegar, and annoynting the place often therwith, you shall see the effect.

To cause a woman to bring forth a dead creature.

Take of the rotes of Enula in the ende of Maye, or else from the Moneth of Julie buto September, and distill them those was a Limbeck after they be brayed, and of the water that shall come forth, you shall give morning and evening buto the pastient to drinke two or three ounces at a time, and the effect will followe.

Against the crestes of the piles in the fundiment.

Take of Willistlie, and of Paritorie, and being meddled with salt, braye it berie well, and lay it byon the sore. It helpeth

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alfo to take of Capillus veneris in ponder, of Onions, and of Aristologia rotunda, of eche as much as you please, and being brayed togither, lay them byon the fore.

To remedie a tongue aggrauated, which through ouermuch moysture pronounceth not well.

Take of Pustarde siede, and bear them, and being meddled with god Pony, give the sicke therof to holde in his mouth the quantitie of an Pasell nut, and giving it to be sucked so; an olde cough, it is of a marvelous efficacie.

To heale the paine of the Collick.

Take a quantitie of the liver of a Pospole, and being boyled, take the oyle therof, with the which announting the place where the pation is, it is of a verie excellent operation, and it is knowne to worke the like effect in all other griefes occasioned through coloneste.

To drie vp milke in the brefts.

Cause the woman to be in hir meates the seedes of Smas lage, and likewise the herbe sodden after what maner you please. The like effect is done, by taking the seedes of Nigella sodden in wine, and given to drinke.

To deminish the sleugme of the bodie, and to augment the bloud.

Let the partie that is in such fort eate energy morning falting, seaven drammes of small Reysons fasting, and the effect will follow.

A remedie to cause conception.

Some Philitions aftirme, that Dzientall Amber helpeth bus to conception, not with Kanding I efficience, as by experience also I have proved, that it is but a weake remode. Therfore announting a pencell with Dyle of Balme, and touching the Pilli.

The fourth and last part

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month of the matrix therewith, it is a verie perfite medicine but o generation, taking here not withstanding, that it be not a counterfeit oyle, but true, which you shall know in this maner, take a drop thereof and cast it into a Cup of water, if it go but the bottome it is perfite, or if you drop it bypon a wollen cloth it will make no spot.

To heale paine in the feete.

Take of the leaves and flowers of Dugwort, and meddle them, braying ther with Swines greate, and emplaister the place of the griefe, and you shall see the successe.

#### To heale Wheales.

Take a quantitie of imploe Hintes, and with leven as much as sufficeth, being brayed togither, make a playifer, and lay it boon the sore, and in a short space, it will make it ripe & bole.

To heale inward ruptures.

Take of Germander, brayed in a Porter with a peffell of wod, and infule it in god white or red wine, that is a ffringent, and give the patient thereof many times to drinke, and certainely it will worke a maruellous effect unto all ruptures within the bodie.

To remedie griefes proceeding through going out of the ioyntes, and to heale swellings.

Take Agrimonie and braye the tender partes thereof very well, and lay them boon the fore place in fread of a playfter, and you shall see it works a sayre and quick successe.

To heale the paine of the splene and the Ptisick.

Take of the inice of Strawberies, and meddle it with hong, and adding thereto a little quantitic of whyte Pepper, give it but the licke partie.

To remedie the puntures of bones or stingings of dead Serpents.

Take of the opper partes of Gladian, and making pouder thereof meddle it togither with wine, and binde it opon the flingings, and it will beliver you of the poplon.

To take away wearinesse, after great labor and griefe of the members.

Take Hoarehound, and having taken out the inice thereof, meddle it with Dyle of Roles, and with the linement an nount the partes, and presently you shall be whole.

To heale one that lotheth meate.

Take of the leaves of Dyll and boyle them in water, of the which give the partie to drinke four ounces and a halfe, and it will heale the tothsonnesse, a ventositie of the stomack, and smelling but the herbe newly gathered with the side, it will cause the poring to go from him that is molested therwith

To heale percussions of the eyes.

Take freshe Bettony and boyle it, and beyng taken out and strayned, braye it, and with the sayde herbe make a Cataplatine bypon the place of the Percusion.

To remedie the paine of the splene.

The Tammempli flowers and make them into pouder, of the which give the diseased to drinke morning and evening, one dramme at a time, in three ownces of whyte Whine, and a little of a childes brine, not as yet come to pollution, and continuing this certague dayes, it will restore the splene but o hys former health.

Against the great griefes of the body.

Take of Sincksople, of Pulegium, and of Poppse leaves, of eche like quantitie: boyle them in Take, and somentate the place of the griefe, and the intent will follow.

To heale the plurifey.

Take of the leanes of wylde Ballowes, and boyle them in Dyle, and beying taken out, by ay them in a Boyler, and put them into a pace of linnen cloth, and applie it but o the place of the griefe, and prefently it will cause the paine to cease.

To remedie the stinking at the nose, and difficultie of hearing.

Take of the fuice of Jup leanes, and put therof into the note, and it will doe the effect: or elfe, for hearing, diffill the faide fuice medled with wine, and of the liquor that thall be diffilled drop into the eares, and you shal see within a little space, a mare uellous helpe.

To heale the scorchings of fire.

Take of Serpillum one ounce, of Litarge of filner this ounces, of Roles as much more, braye them in a Porter, and put thereto of ware, of Beares greafe, and of Hartes greafe, halfe a pound of them all, boyle enery thing, and being frayned, keepe it for a liniment.

To dissolue the crestes of the French disease.

Take the greate of an Hen, and of a Ducke, of eche fine drammes, of the marrow of a Cowes bones, and of fresh butter, of the chie drammes, of Storax liquida soure drammes and a halfe, of the fat of a Calfe ten drammes, of Hisopus humida one ounce and a halfe, of ople of Camonill, of Oleum irinum, of sweete Almonds and of Hallick, of ech fine drams, of Aucillages made of the rotes of marsh Pallowes, of Enula, and of the rotes of Ireos, of ech one ounce, of Armoniack, of Bdellium, a of Serapine, of ech one dram and a half. Boyle these rotes with the Cummes in water, and a little vinegar, butill the Aucillages he consumed, then straine it, and make a Aucillage, The which

you thall meddle with thother things, ercept the Hisopus humida, and the Storax. And boyle them butill the Huciliages be confirmed, then straine them all, and meddle therewith of Turpentine one ounce and a halfe: of Sastron one dramme, of ware as much as sufficeth, and put therebuto the Hisopus and the Storax, and one ownce of ertina Duichsilver, and make a Cerote, and ble it, and you shall finde it marvelous.

Against swellings of womens bellies that make them to seeme with childe.

Take of Parlenep ledes, and being brayed, make pouder of them, and with wine give the woman therof to drinke, the quantitie of one dramme at a time morning and evening falting, and it will doe the effect.

## To clense the face from spottes.

Take of the rotes of Ireos two drammes, of the rotes of Eleborus niger one dramme, bray them into ponder, and meddle them with Hony, and at evening when you go to bed annoint the face, a wall it in the morning with warme water.

### To heale the torsions and griefes of the bellie.

Take halfe a dramme of Ircos pouder, and being medled in tharpe or folice wine give it the ficke to drinke, and if it be put into the medicines that purge the bodye, he shall fiele no torsions as long as he is a purging.

To remedie the burning or heate of wrine.

Take of yolkes of Egges with their whites, thee, of Dyle Onfacine one ownce and a halfe, of the flowing of Barlie one ownce, of Saffron one scruple, of Toxianders preparated, of Sozrell sedes, of Mirtell berries, of eche halfe a dramme. Bray energy thing in a Leaden Forter with a pesfell of the same, meddling therivith of Voguentum populson one ownce, and Z.U.

make an ointment, with the which being colde, annoynt the partes betwirt the testicles and the fundiment, and it will be of a marucilous efficacie.

To remedie percussions or falling vpon the ribbes or back.

Take of Litarge, of Rolen, of sche one ounce, of Tum Armoniack, of Teruce, of eche halfe an ounce, of Galbanum, of Incense, of sche three drammes, of ople of Roles and of Pirtels, of sch as much as sufficeth, of ware a little, meddle them and make a Terote, and being layde byon the bruse, you shall see a sodeine and maruellous effect.

Against burning occasioned of colde.

Take of the inice of a Pulberie tree, and meddle it with lyke quantitie of oyle Dline, wher with annount the burnt places, and they will be hole. It helpeth also to boyle the leanes of Rew in oyle, and being Arained to annount the place.

To heale wheales or blifters in the face.

Take of Hirrhe, of Costus, of Cassia lignea, of ethe like quantitie, after they be brayed, meddle them with Honye, and annount the some at evening when you go to bed, and in the morning wash it with water made with Branne that is hote: or else annount it with the meals of Orobo meddled with water and Hony. The speale of Dtes distoluted in binegar, and the place announced therewith doth the like effect. It helpeth also to annount the place with the blowd of ones arms fasting.

To make skarres become fayre of colour.

Take of the greate of an Alle, or of a Calfe, and putting there to of Hirrhe, of opie, t of Saffron, meddle them and keepe it in a braken belieff, and being a little warmed, annount there with the skarres. It helpeth also to annount the skarres with

the Saivle of a Sea Scoppion, and you thall the a verie haps pie fuccesse.

To take away the bleachnesse of blowes.

Take the pyll of a Radithe, and being brayed and disolucd with Hony, annoynt the place. It analyte also to brave grene Smallage, and being medled with the white of an Egge to lay it boon the place. The inice of Taplia, is of a present efficacie, medled with the pouder of Incense, and Teruce, and so applyed but the sore.

Against the swellings of Percussions.

Take of the gairle of an Give, and being medled with the milke of a woman, laye it byon the fore: or else take the doung of a Swine, and drie it between two dishes in an Duen, then bray it, and mire it with Dyle, and it will worke the effect beyng applyed but the sore.

To heale those that have paine in their lyuer.

Ause the sick to drinke of the inice of Cicorie, or of Envine in brothe, or with water of Yony: even so likewise the said berbe both help being dried and the ponder given to drink. Also Jup brayed with Endine into ponder and given to drinke doth the like effect. And so do the rotes of a Daple tree braied and given to drinke the quantitie of an ounce and a halfe, with sweet wine: or else a quantitie of Spica Celvica given in drink, worketh a manifest remedie. It helpeth to take the sleshe of three Snayles, and being brayed and dissolved with sources of red wine, to give it to drinke.

To heale the paynes of the brefts, which happen.
after the birth of a childe.

Take a quantitic of Egge thelles, and being brayed into pour der, meddle there with of the yolkes of fodden Egges three:

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of Daffron, and of oyle of Koles, of ech a little, make a Cerote, and lage it byon the breft.

Against the scurfe of the head.

Take of Dyle of Auts, and of Dyle Dline, of ech lyke quantitie, and having first walhed the head, annoynt it with the sayde Dyle, and with twice annoynting, the scurse will be consumed.

To heale a plurifey by spitting.

Take a quantitie of the thelles of Pafell Puttes, and being brayed into ponder with Oximel fimplex, and Julep of Miolets as much as fufficeth, it will cause the fick person to a noyde & plurisey by sucking theros so that you that see the effect.

Against moyst sores.

Take of the rotes of Tiperus, and being beared into pouder, put of the pouder into the wound. It helpeth also to burne the ryndes of drie Gourdes, and to put of the pouder into the sozes: so likewise both the pouder of Dyll sowers: or else, the pouder of the leaves of a Cipres trie, or the fruits therof brayed with Wine, and layd by on the soze.

To heale woundes, which after they are whole brust out a newe, by reason of a putrissed bone.

Take of the pouder of the rotes of Dog Kennell, and put it therin, and it will cause the chiners of bones to issue forth. Also the seeds of Henbane brayed with Lime do helpe. Drelse take the seases of Kigges brayed with wilde Poppie, and boyled in Potage, and layd byon the sore.

To heale the crestie swellings of the Piles.

Take of Aerdegreafe, of Allum, of the droffe of Braffe double the weight of the other things, braye them, and make them

them liquide with vinegar, and make therefa liniment. Also it helpeth to take of the heades of Henewes burned and rolled Onyons, medled togither and layd byon the soze.

> Against euill disposition through coldnesse of the stomack.

Take of the rotes of Enula two ounces, of Fennell lades one ounce and a half, of Pepper one ounce, of Perfly lades halfe an ounce, of Rochet lades one ounce, of Sefelios one opamme, of clarified Young one pound, meddle them and make a lectuarie, of the which give the pacient two sponefuls in the morning, and at evening when he goeth to bed with god wine,

To heale the loffe or diminishing of smelling.

Castor, or Beniomin dissoluce in binegar and Salt: or else bute with binegar or Prarmaca, or Elleborus niger, or the fuice of the herbe Ciclamen put into the nose.

To cause that heare shall not grow againe.

A proint the place where you would not have heare to grow and when the warme bloud of an Pace as some as it is killed, and whom that annount with wilde Rettle sedes brayed, and discoursed with ople Dive: or else with the braines of Battes brayed and discourse with womans milke, annoint the place.

To heale eleftes or chappings of the

T Ake of Mermilion and of Hirrhe, and make fomentation binder it. It helpeth also maruelouslye to take Mermilion biaged, and meddled with Pomata, or with oyle of Roses, and ther with to annoint the fundament in the chappings.

Against retention of vrine in Agues.

Take a quantitie of the leaves of Tarden Miolets, and make a plaisfer with them after they be fooden, and lay it oppon the bottome of the belies: or else roste an Duyon, and being hote, lay it byon the said place, and your intent will follow.
